Russian Enterprise.

It is pointed out that Russia has not waited for the completion of her great transcontinental railway enterprise before beginning another transportation route of almost equal interest. This is the construction of a deep water route from the Black Sea to the Baltic. The distance from sea to sea is about 1,200 miles, but the greater part of the route follows the course of the rivers. The distance across the watershed between the Dvina, which flows north, and the Dnieper, which empties into the Black Sea, to less than 200 miles. The cost of the work is placed at \$150,000,000, which is thought to be a very small sum for 200 miles of canal and the improvement of 1,000 miles of river. It is claimed that the completion of this canal will make Russia independent of the Dardanelles as a naval route to the Black Sea.

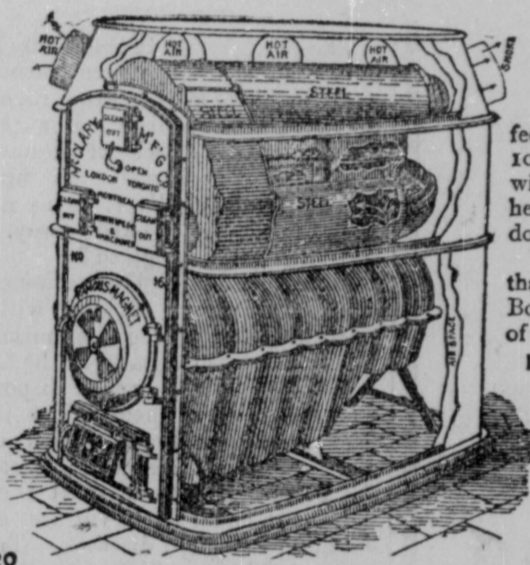
