THE BUDGET.

Having estimated reductions in expenditure amounting to \$2,000,000 and received the approval of Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. Davies, the Minister of Finance goes on to complete the work of restoring the financial equilibrium by adding half a cent a pound to the duty on sugar and 12 cents a gallon upon spirits.

RECIPROCITY.

—Writs have been issued for an election in the Third District of Prince County, to fill the vacancy in the Legislative Assembly caused by the elevation of the Hon. Mr. Arsenault. The election will be held on the 25th July; nomination on the 18th.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, May 2.—The Dutch brigantine Anna was towed into Gibraltar yesterday. She reported that on the afternoon of April 25, while bound off the Riff Coast a party of Moors attacked her and shot and killed members of the crew and seriously wounded the captain and mate.

WINNIPEG, May 2.—A Killarney despatch to the Free Press says: A party over from St. John's, North Dakota, last night reports that the inhabitants of St. John's have been moved out of the town and are barricading the houses with cordwood to resist arrest.

WAR IN THE AIR.

A despatch to the London Standard from Paris says that a general manifestation of French opinion against any active intervention by France to coerce Japan has had a salutary effect.

LONDON, May 2.—In reply to inquiries in the House of Commons today, Sir Edward Grey Under-Secretary, stated that Nicaragua proposed that the trouble between that country and England be settled by arbitration.

PARIS, May 2.—The authorities said yesterday that seventeen soldiers have died in the military hospital at Vitre, twenty-one miles east of Rennes, on the Vilaine, from eating American tinned meat.

BERLIN, May 2.—The Hamburger Nachrichten says: "Germany's co-operation with Russia and France in the East may have useful results in various directions."

TO DEFEAT RUSSIA.

The London Times prints the following from Kobe, under the date of April 26: "There are unmistakable evidences of a serious crisis in the relations between Japan and Russia."

NEW YORK, May 3.—A Managua, Nicaragua, special says: "The reported concessions by England are not favorably received by the public."

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 2.—Sir Herbert Murray, British Commissioner, has his measures for the assistance of distressed Newfoundland fishermen fully matured.

LONDON, May 2.—In the House of Commons today Sir John Kinloch, member for Perthshire, and Robert Ferguson, M. P. for Aberdeenshire, urged the necessity for a speedy decision in reference to the Canadian cattle question.

QUERO, May 2.—The government has decided to send a schooner with \$2,000 worth of seed grain to the destitute settlers of the Labrador coast.

CARLETON, May 2.—In the Cape Colony parliament, which opened today, a proposition was submitted to absorb Bechuanaland.

PORT SAID, May 2.—The French troopship Tilet, conveying troops for Madagascar, is ashore in the Suez canal. She lies in a bad position and her situation is such that passage through the canal is suspended pending her floating.

CARLETON, May 2.—In his speech today at the opening of the session of the colonial parliament, the governor announced that arrangements had been made for the appointment of Cape Colony and Canada of delegates to prepare a treaty of commerce.

HAVANA, May 2.—The government has information of an encounter on the Bandera plantation in Santa Ana, between a detachment of Spanish troops under Col. Sandoval and a band of rebels led by chief Quintin. The insurrectionists are said to have been defeated. Subsequently Col. Sandoval and his men near Mogote mountain, in eastern Cuba, had a fight with another band of rebels, in which the insurrectionists' leaders, Marcos and Ramirez, were killed. Ramirez is the rebel of that name who was previously reported to have surrendered himself to the authorities.

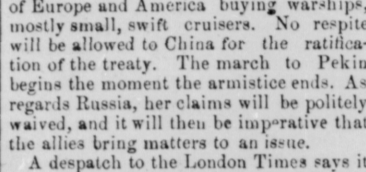

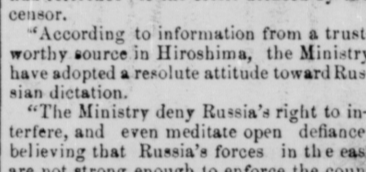

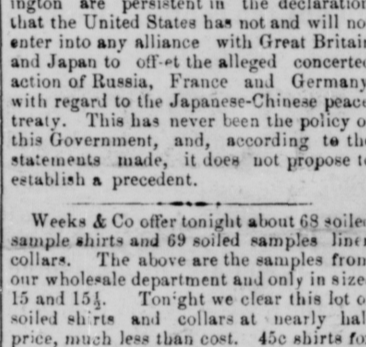

THE BUDGET SPEECH.

Review of Financial Situation.

20 Cents a Gallon Added to Excise Duty on Spirits; 12 1-2 Cents to Cus-toms Duty on Spirits, and Half a Cent a Pound on Sugar.

Bright Outlook for Improved Trade.

OTTAWA, May 4.

Hon Mr Foster was loudly cheered yesterday afternoon as he rose to make his budget speech. He plunged at once into business, giving a comparative statement of the finances of the past fiscal year, and that of the year previous. The expenditure for the year 1893-94 was \$1,210,332 greater than the revenue, while in 1892-93 we had a surplus of \$1,354,355.

Commenting on these figures, he gave details of the reduction of receipts to show that the decrease of Customs revenue cannot be attributed to any particular line of importation, but is general. A large proportion was due to under-consumption and shrinkage of values. There were certain signs of betterment by which he estimated the revenue for the present year would reach \$33,500,000. The total expenditure would be figured, he estimated, at \$38,484,113. But he estimated on a conservative basis that \$1,064,113 could be saved on this, making the actual expenditure \$37,300,000, and making a total expected deficit of \$4,500,000 on a basis of a total actual and estimated revenue of \$33,500,000. He had tried to be as conservative as possible in his figures and to give the House the plain facts of the situation without garniture. The finance minister enlarged on this showing, going quite fully into the details. Referring to the period of depression, Hon. Mr. Foster said that no banks had failed in Canada since the outbreak of the war, and that not one of our industries had been less maintained, and want and poverty have been practically unknown in Canada, and comparatively the Canadian people have outdined the storm with their vessels less battered and sails less stattered than any other country in the world (cheers); and in the very midst of the financial and business tempest, Canada ran her flag of credit in the very centre of London up to the very highest notch, which it has been unfurled from the time the Canadian Provinces were united. (Renewed cheers) The tide he believed had now turned. Prices were recovering, confidence is growing, trade is increasing, the demand of the consumers is strengthening, revenue is beginning to mend and Canada is working on her well laid basis of resources, rich as they are, added to the facilities for transport with which she is splendidly equipped, a sound fiscal policy (cheers) and good financial management. (Renewed cheers and interjection from Mr. McMullen of "good boy.") Canada, said the Minister, was to day emerging from her period of trial into an era of brightness and prosperity, which would surely surpass in her previous history. (Loud cheers) He said it was proposed to place a duty of one half cent per pound on raw sugar and to increase the protection on refined sugar and articles into which sugar largely enters, proportionately, and only proportionately, to the increased tax of a half cent on raw sugar; also a slight additional to the tax upon distilled spirits. The excise duty on spirits is now \$1.50 per gallon and we propose to add 20 cents per gallon and make the excise duty \$1.70. The customs duty on spirits is now \$2.24 per gallon, and he proposed to make that \$2.25—an increase of 12 1/2 cents.

Sir Richard Cartwright spoke in reply until 9.30, when the debate was adjourned till Tuesday, when Sir Richard will continue.
