Preparation for Life.

A very sensible and practical article on "School Culture of the Observing Faculties" appears in the December Popular Science Monthly, in which the writer maintains that more important than learning to read and to accept blindly the opinions of other men, is the ability to observe accurately and to draw correct inferences for one's self. The boy was not trained to observe and to think for himself when the subjects he had to examine and to think about were comparatively simple, and now the grown man will not or cannot do it; or, if he does actually try, he is as likely to go astray as to go right, for he now must begin on what is extremely complex."
