Our Young Men and Women.

Revenue and Expenditure.

The final statement of the accounts for fiscal year ending June 30 last has been issued by the Finance Department. It shows the total revenue for the year to be \$25,864,494, and the expenditure \$26,698,005, leaving a deficit of about \$835,000.
