The Police Magistrate of St. John, N. B., has delivered judgment against a number of saloon keepers for selling hop beer, as against the provisions of the Liquor License Act of New Brunswick.

Ex-Gov. St. John, of Kansas, spoke in the new Prohibition Tabernacle, Fort Richmond, S. I., on Sunday last. Among other things he said that the whole license system was a sin against God and should be a crime; that the consumption of liquor in Kansas is one gill a year to every person, while in New York it is at least twenty-five gallons to each person.

The Charlton Sabbath Observance bill, after passing through the hands of the special committee, goes to parliament shorn of many of its principal clauses, struck out because they conflicted with provincial legislation.

We are glad to hear that the prospects are in favor of a sufficiency of fodder being garnered this season for the coming winter, and that we will not likely experience a famine such as overtook the farmers last winter.

Sexton Will Succeed McCarthy.

LONDON, July 18th.—Mr. Sexton has obtained the support of several Irish bishops and is increasing the adhesion of members who will support him as leader of the Irish party on Mr. McCarthy's withdrawal.

A Canadian Lord.

Lord and Lady Mount-Stephen and their daughter, Lady Northcote, are at Homburg. They will return to England about the 27th, and Lord Mount-Stephen is then to take his seat in the House of Lords.

The Sabbath Observance Bill.

The special committee to which was referred Mr. Charlton's Sabbath Observance bill held its final meeting recently and decided to report the bill in this shape:— 1. Whoever shall on the Lord's day, either as proprietor, publisher or manager, engage in the printing, publication or delivery of a newspaper, journal or periodical, and whoever shall on the Lord's day engage in the sale, distribution or circulation of any newspaper, journal or periodical printed published on that day, shall be deemed to be guilty of a misdemeanor; provided, however, that necessary office work may be performed after nine o'clock in the evening of the Lord's day, for the purpose of facilitating the publication of the Monday morning issue of any daily newspaper.

At such time as the laws of the United States shall make corresponding provision, no through freight in transit from one point on the frontier, of the United States to some other point on the said frontier, shall be allowed to pass over Canadian roads on the Lord's day, except live stock and perishable goods.

The bill has been shown of many of its principal clauses, which were struck out because they conflicted with provincial legislation.

Astonomical Notes.

The Educational Review says, "A student" is puzzled because his almanac says (1) that summer commences on June 22, and (2) that June 24 is midsummer; and because (he says) Dowden says in his Shakespeare Primer that the 'midsummer night' of the 'Dream' was the night of May 11. The summer that begins on June 21—not June 22—is the astronomical summer, the second quarter of the tropical year.

Smith's Successor.

LONDON, July 15.—Hon. W. H. Smith who has to resign the leadership in the Commons owing to ill health, is suffering from the effects of suppressed gout. Party talk now assigns the succession to the leadership in commons to Right Hon. Charles Thomson Ritchie, president of the local government board.

An Idea of the Woolly West.

KANSAS CITY, July 17.—Several of the richest men in Kansas City have organized for the purpose of supplying cold air throughout the city through conduits. The Common Council has granted the company a franchise. The projectors are content to possess and will sell fresh air to any part of the city and remove the impure atmosphere at a very low cost per square foot.

Prof. Wiggins' New Novel.

OTTAWA, July 17.—Prof. E. Stone Wiggins, the weather prophet, has returned from New York, where he arranged for the publication of his rthcoming novel dealing with life on the planet Mars.

G. T. R. Employes Complain.

LONDON, Ont., July 16.—Local G. T. R. employes have been notified that in future they will have to pay full freight rates the same as ordinary customers of the line. This, allowing so closely on the reduction in the wages of the railwaymen is causing the latter to feel very sore, inasmuch as it means a very considerable amount out of their pockets.

Grashopper Plague.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., July 17.—The grass hopper ravages in the northern and western counties of New Mexico are doing incalculable harm. Some farmers consider them seventeen year locusts, which ravaged the West during the seventies. The locusts have stripped vegetation and the leaves of trees and left nothing but the dry alkali earth where they have straggled the ground. They are in bunches four and five miles wide. They do not make much progress after flying, but the egg they lay hatches and a new batch flies eastward.

Not The Reason At All.

BANNOB, Me., July 17.—Congressman Boutelle received a telegram to-day from the deputy collector of customs at Eastport that the Dominion fishing cruiser Dream seized seven American fishing boats on Thursday forenoon in that harbor. The crew were landed there and the boats towed to St. Andrews, N. S.

Canadian Eggs in England.

It will be seen by a perusal of our special correspondence from London, England, that Canadian eggs are beginning to attract the attention which their quality and style of package merits in the British markets. During the month of May last over 500,000 great hundreds or 5,000 dozen Canadian eggs were received into Great Britain, which, as our correspondent remarks, looks as if the trade had been established on a firm basis for our eggs on the other side.
