

# Orioles Shade Red Sox; Yanks Swamp Athletics

Hobbling Joe Ginsberg stroked a long pinch single into left field in Boston Thursday and broke up the longest game of the American League season.

It was the turning point as Baltimore Orioles defeated the Red Sox 7-5 in 15 innings of rain-interrupted baseball which went four hours and 23 minutes.

In other AL games Thursday, Chicago White Sox blasted Kansas City's visiting Athletics 7-2

and New York Yankees moved into Washington and clobbered the Senators 11-3.

There were two day games in the National League — Philadelphia Phils defeating the host Milwaukee Braves 3-1 and Chicago White Sox defeating San Francisco 4-3 in the opening game of their west coast series.

Ed Bouchee, in his first NL appearance of the season, blasted his last 32 games, grooved a home run for the Phils. It was also his first start after his con-

struction on a morals charge last March and he was greeted by a momentary silence, then polite applause as he came to bat in the first. He struck out but came through in the eighth with the score tied 1-1. It was Robin Roberts' 195th victory against 150 losses. Carl Wiley lost his first of the season to two wins.

**FORD WINS**  
It was Jim Landis at Chicago. Landis, who has hit safely in 30 of his last 32 games, grooved a two-run double and a two-run

single to help along the White Sox romp.  
Whitely Ford went the route for New York, aided by Mickey Mantle's two homers and a single round-tripper by Norm Siebern. Bob Lemon and Rockie Bridges each came up with homers in a losing cause. Russ Kemmerer lost it.

A crowd of 3,477 watched shortstop Ernie Banks as he crashed his 380-foot home run over the leftfield fence in San Francisco to give the Cubs the victory over the Giants. It was the slim infielder's 21st of the season, putting him one off the pace set by Pittsburgh's Frank Thomas.

**CINCINNATI (CP)** — Taill George Witt and stubby Roy Face doled out seven hits piling Pittsburgh's Pirates to a 2-0 shutout of Cincinnati's Redlegs Thursday night. It was the second whitewash loss for the Reds in three days.

A double play helped reliever Face shut off a threat in the ninth inning and secure the victory.

Face took over in the seventh inning after Burgess collected a single and Hoak walked. He got Redleg slugger Frank Robinson to hit into a force play and pinch-hitter Ed Bailey grounded out to end the inning.

Redleg starter Joe Nuxhall had held the Pirates in check for the first four innings. But Pittsburgh finally got to him for the two runs in the sixth.

# Toronto Golfer Still In Race At Open Event

AKRON, Ohio (CP)—The \$22,000 Rubber City Open golf tournament turned into a birdie shooting match Thursday as 45 of 130 starters broke par and Toronto's Al Bolding shot a 32-64, one off the pace set by Americans Ed Griffiths and Art Wall Jr.

Jerry Magee of Toronto and Rudy Horvath of Windsor, Ont., were well behind. Magee posted a 37-33-70 and Horvath shot a 37-34-71.

Bolding would have tied for the top spot, but a 12-foot putt on the final green hit the back of the cup and stayed out.

Tommy Bolt of Paradise, Fla., the U.S. National Open champion, shot a 33-35-66 over the Firestone Country Club's 6,620-yard, 35-36-71 layout.

That left Bolt in a seven-way tie with Jack Fleck, Ed Oliver, Doug Ford, Gordon Jones of Alliance, Ohio; Johnny Post of Shreveport, La.; Bob Rosburg and Horvath.

The field will be cut to the low 60 professionals and 10 amateurs following today's round, and 18-hole sessions will be held Saturday and Sunday. First prize is \$2,800.

# Release Of Kidnapped Is Delayed

HAVANA (AP)—A diplomatic snag was reported Thursday to be blocking the release of 45 kidnapped North Americans still held by Cuban guerrillas in the hills of eastern Cuba.

Informants here hinted rebel leader Fidel Castro was hedging on orders to his men to free the captives.

The orders were broadcast Wednesday night by Castro's headquarters in the mountains of Oriente province. The broadcast said because of poor communications the rebel leader had known nothing of the kidnapping of 47 Americans and three Canadians by guerrilla bands headed by his brother Raul. But it added:

"If that is the case, their liberty is hereby ordered."

Four Americans and one Canadian — Edward Cannon of Cornwall, Ont. — were flown out of the rebel country in a U.S. navy helicopter Wednesday night after U.S. Consul Park Wollam spent several days talking with the rebels.

HENLEY - ON - THAMES, England (Reuters) — Mighty-muscled Russian oarsmen won four races at the Henley Royal Regatta Thursday.

In the premier race of the regatta, the Leningrad Trud Club won by a comfortable 1½ lengths over the University of Washington crew from Seattle.

Racing in torrential rain, thunder and lightning, Trud got away brilliantly. Rowing powerfully, Trud led by half-length at the quarter-mile post and never was headed over the one-mile, 550-yard course.

Trud's time was six minutes 49 seconds, fastest yet at the regatta. Trud meets London Rowing Club in today's semi-final.

# Canada Takes 2-0 Lead In Davis Cup Competition

TORONTO (CP) — Don Fontana of Toronto and Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., two veterans of international tennis, Thursday gave Canada a 2-0 lead over Cuba in the opening singles of the first-round North American Davis Cup competition.

The Canadians took a commanding lead in the best-of-five match series as they overpowered the inexperienced Cubans with remarkable ease. Neither of the Canadians was extended and Canada's team appears headed for a clean sweep of the four

singles and one doubles match. The 27-year-old Fontana, ranked second in Canada and playing in his fourth Davis Cup series, whipped Raoul Karman, 20-year-old Cuban champion, 6-2, 6-2, 6-3 and the 27-year-old Bedard, who holds the Canadian crown, breezed to a 6-0, 6-1, 6-0 win over 16-year-old Adolfo Minoso, one of the youngest players ever to play in Davis Cup competition.

A crowd of less than 500 at the Toronto Cricket, Skating and Curling Club saw the Canadians overcome the Cuban youngsters without any fuss. Fontana wrapped up his match in 54 minutes and Bedard, on Canada's team for the sixth straight year, took only 37 minutes to avenge Minoso.

The doubles will be played and captain Lorne Main named Fontana and Bedard as the Canadian combination. The Cuban pair likely will be Karman and Minoso, but playing captain Antonio Diaz said he hasn't definitely decided yet whether to play himself and save Minoso for the two concluding singles Saturday.

The winner of the round will advance against the United States here next week.

# Irishman Leads In British Open

LYTHAM, England (Reuters) — Christy O'Connor of Ireland played around the sodden Royal Lytham and St. Anne's course with a 68 Thursday to take a one-stroke lead after the second round of the British Open golf championship.

O'Connor's round gave him a total of 135 for 36 holes, one less than Argentine champion Leonardo Ruiz who came nowhere with a brilliant 65 to grab second place.

Ruiz' score matched the record in the open, set 24 years ago by Peter Thomson of Australia, the overnight leader and favorite to win the title for the fourth time, faltered, taking 72 for a total of 138. He shared third place with big Dave Thomas of Wales, who shot a 68.

Thomas was in top form, driving long and accurately. Thomson, on the other hand, had par after 14 holes, but an eagle 3 at the 15th, where he sank a 25-yard putt from just off the green, started him on a great recovery.

The title seems virtually certain to change hands, for Bobby Locke, the South African defending champion, though recovering from his poor first round with a 70, had 146—eleven strokes behind O'Connor. He just managed to gain a place among the 40 players with scores of 147 and better who will play the final 36 holes today.

Par for the 6,635-yard seaside links is 35-36-71. There was deep water in low places and the greens were almost muddy after nearly a week of rain. Bright sunshine broke out for the first time in the tournament and started to dry up the soggy course.

# Stroke Way Easily Into Wimbledon Tennis Finals

LONDON (Reuters) — Defending champion Althea Gibson of New York and unseeded Angela Mortimer of Britain stroked their way easily into the women's singles final in the Wimbledon tennis championships Thursday.

They gained crushing victories in two of the most one-sided women's semi-finals in post-war Wimbledon tournaments.

Miss Gibson overwhelmed 19-year-old left-hander Ann Haydon of Britain 6-2, 6-0 in 33 minutes. Miss Mortimer took two minutes less to sweep aside Mrs. Suzy Kormoczy, 34-year-old Budapest veteran, 6-0, 6-1.

The final will be played Saturday.

Miss Gibson's big service and accurate volleying were too much for Miss Haydon. The British player began nervously with a double fault and Miss Gibson never allowed her to recover.

The triumph of 26-year-old Miss Mortimer marked her recovery from illness that has dogged her for the last two years and robbed her of her place as Britain's leading player.

She went to Australia last winter and not only picked up her health but the Australian singles title as well. She now has the chance to become the first British Wimbledon champion in 20 years.

Ashley Cooper and Neale Frazer, two suburban Australians who grew up together on the tennis courts of Melbourne, will battle for the men's singles crown today. Cooper was runner-up last year to compatriot Lew Hoad, now a professional.

In her four previous meetings with Miss Gibson, Miss Mortimer has won three times but the American player unseated her as the French champion in 1956.

The men's doubles produced a striking match on the centre court in which the Swedish pair, Sven Davidson and Ulf Schmidt, defeated the Indian team of Ramanathan Krishnan and Nareth Kumar 6-4, 7-9, 6-4, 11-0. That put the Swedes into the semi-finals.

Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, and his Australian partner, Merwyn Rose, advanced to the semi-finals with a 6-3, 5-7, 6-3, 6-2 victory over Ilija Panajovic and Ivko Plecivic of Yugoslavia.

# Honor Red Sox Ball Player

Miss Mooney, representing Mayor Gladys Porter and the citizens of Kentville, presented Gernert's wife with a box of roses. Gernert played ball at Kentville for two seasons.

Premier Stanfield also presented Gernert with a wrist watch and a plaid jacket.

The flag of Nova Scotia was flown with the stars and stripes.
