Maritime Board Of Trade To Hold Silver Jubilee Meeting

MONCTON (CP)—The Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, foster parent of many efforts to bolster the Atlantic economy during the last 50 years, celebrates its silver jubilee at a three-day convention opening here Sunday.

Two of its children—the Atlantic provinces economic council and the Maritimes transportation commission—are young but booming advocates of a better deal for the four east coast provinces.

The board itself, still sprightly after more than a half century of often rough going in its quest for economic equality for the Maritimes, has the avowed aim "to develop and present informed views of business and community to the Atlantic provinces legislatures and . . . the federal government."

To promote its program, the board this year has drawn upon top-level business and government spokesmen and panel discussion participants.

Ronald W. Todgham of Windsor, Ont., president of Chrysler Corp. of Canada, opens convention speech-making Monday.

Among other guest speakers are T. C. A. Hislop, New Zealand's high commissioner to Canada; R. R. Mundle of Montreal, representing the Canadian Chamber of Commerce; Premier Hugh John Fleming of New Brunswick; J. A. Faux of Halifax, regional supervisor of the Great West Assurance Company and G. A. Filippelli, of Trail, B.C., president of the Superior Chamber of Commerce of Canada.

On the business side of the convention, the board executive meets Sunday night. Reports will be received Monday and Tuesday from board committees, the transportation commission and the resolutions commission, policy and bylaws committees.

PANEL DISCUSSION
A three-provincial discussion panel is scheduled for Monday afternoon on the topic, Agriculture in the Atlantic Provinces. Taking part will be Nova Scotia's deputy agriculture minister Waldo Walsh of Halifax; APEC President R. Whidden Ganong of St. Stephen; J. Lincoln Dewar of Charlottetown, secretary of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture; C. M. McLean of Charlottetown, general manager of the Co-Op Super Market and H. H. Smith of Saint John, N.B., port and industrial commissioner.

Mr. Fleming will conclude proceedings Tuesday.

Thomson Group Buys Newspaper

PENTICTON, B. C. (CP)—The Penticon Herald has been sold to the Thomson newspaper interests, it was announced here Friday.

G. J. Rowland, owner of the newspaper, said the Herald was acquired by Woodbridge Co. Ltd., a subsidiary of the newspaper interests of Roy H. Thomson. The change in ownership becomes effective Oct. 24.

Mr. Rowland, who has operated the Herald since 1940 and became owner in 1945, said he will continue as publisher and no personnel or editorial policy changes are planned. Terms were not announced.

The Herald, which has published three weekly since November, 1954 with a circulation of about 4,300, was founded in 1906 and had been owned by R. J. McDougall for 25 years before Mr. Rowland took over in 1940.

He said the new owners have announced plans to convert the Herald to daily publication, probably some time next year.
