LETTER FROM

REV. MR. FULLERTON.

State of the Regiment When He Wrote—News of Islanders. SPRINGS, SOUTH AFRICA, July 2, 1900.

MY DEAR MR. JAMES,—Today for the first time there are definite signs of our speedy return. Two officers have left for the collection of invalids and baggage, so that every thing may be ready for shipment at a very early date. Every one here rejoices at the prospect. We are now holding a place small in itself, but important because of its valuable coal mines. Our position is no sinecure as our fighting strength is not more than 350—just think of that 350 out of 1046, the number on starting. The other morning our camp heard the alarm, and immediately we jumped, dressed hurriedly and soon discovered that the Boers were daring enough to steal some cattle from a kraal near one of our outposts. This is accounted for by two reasons: 1st, the commando here is in a state of starvation; and 2nd, their spy system is so complete that they know the small size of our force. We could not attack, of course, but we held the fort successfully and very soon saw them scamper off. Happily there were no casualties.

I am delighted to hear that all in the Kirk are well. May you all long continue to prosper in every good work.

We have just learned of the death from wounds of Lieut. Blanchard who with others were trapped when in charge of a convoy. He was related to Dr. Blanchard.

The Island boys here are all well. Young Kennedy hurt his side through having a nail in his pocket but will be quite well soon. He and Jack Proud are the only two of the Island draft who are left with us, all the others being sick but Horne who is with the Army Service Corps, and a very useful man he is.

McDonald and Weeks are well and in good fighting trim. Remember me to all.

Woolwich,
July 22, 1900

Arrived by the S. S. Montague from South Africa on the 22nd July, and being still very weak I was sent to the hospital at Woolwich.

We had a very good trip here, and did not have one rough day during the whole passage. One man died on the voyage from fever; but considering there were four hundred of us on board, we did very well for invalids. Jack Harris has just left here for a trip to Scotland. James Walker is the only other Islander here. There were four Canadians came on the Montague. I was the only one of company "G." There were thirty Canadians who have been sent here and have now gone back to Africa to join the regiment. I have not had a letter from home since April.

THE PROBS.—Moderate winds; mostly fine. Showers.

FROM BOSTON.—La Grande Duchesse arrived in port last night about eleven o'clock with over 160 passengers.

RASPBERRIES.—The Northumberland's freight yesterday morning included sixty-five barrels of raspberries from places west of Summerside.

MACKEREL.—Mackerel have "struck in" in the harbor, and during the past few days good catches have been made, principally in the mornings.

TOURIST PARTY.—A Raymond Excursion party of fifty arrived by the La Grande Duchesse last night and is registered at the Davies.

PRESBYTERY.—There was a large attendance of ministers at this meeting of Presbytery in Zion church this forenoon. Rev. Mr. Spencer, of Montague, was elected moderator for the next six months and Mr. T. C. James clerk for the year. The matter of the status of church property was discussed and referred to a committee appointed by the Synod to deal with the matter. The call from Dundas to Rev. Mr. Buchanan having been declined it was set aside, and the Presbytery expressed sympathy with the congregation in its disappointment. The minute presented Rev. Dr. Murray, on the occasion of his jubilee, was approved and ordered to be engrossed in the minutes. A committee was appointed to strike standing committees and are to examine session records. The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at half past two.


