Crippled Girls Go In Business With Telephone

TORONTO, Nov. 16—(CP)—Two suburban Toronto girls, unknown to each other until after separate accidents paralyzed them both from the waist down, soon will head into a new venture made possible by well-wishers. Nancy McComb, 22, of Long Branch and Doreen Taylor, 19, of Weston are going into business for themselves by organizing a telephone answering service. It will be conducted from a building being erected as a combined home and office from contributions of money and material.

They became acquainted while convalescing at Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto. Doreen permanently injured her spine in May, 1946, when she fell from a bridge over the Humber River. Seven months later Nancy was struck down by a truck. Public-spirited citizens in New Toronto, adjoining long Branch, formed a committee to aid Nancy, then only 18 and second youngest of eight children whose mother was dead. Their father died a few months after Nancy's accident.

The committee raised \$6,000, nearly half of which went towards medical treatment. The remainder is going to be used to help build the new home and office for the girls. It is planned to raise another \$8,500 and the Canadian Paraplegic Association intends to lend money to get the building started. Doug Taylor, the builder, and Don Russell, New Toronto druggist and chairman of the committee, are soliciting material and volunteer help for the structure. Several builders and construction supply firms already have responded with materials. Nancy's brothers-in-law plan to help on week-ends and any other free days to get the building finished. The girls hope to move in early in January. The one-storey building will have special ramps running from the street level to
