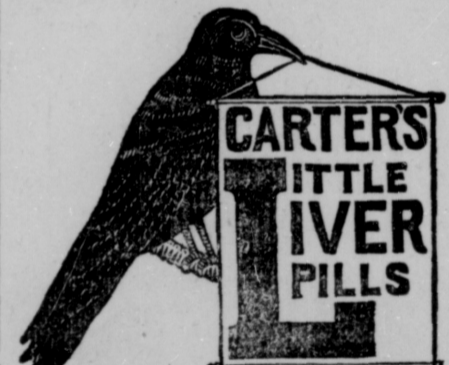
"You can go if you want to," said Leonard. "I told you you'd better at first, but I've got to sit it out and catch my man. I can't write another line without a burglar."

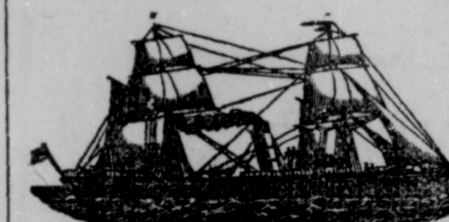

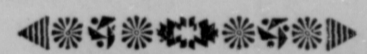

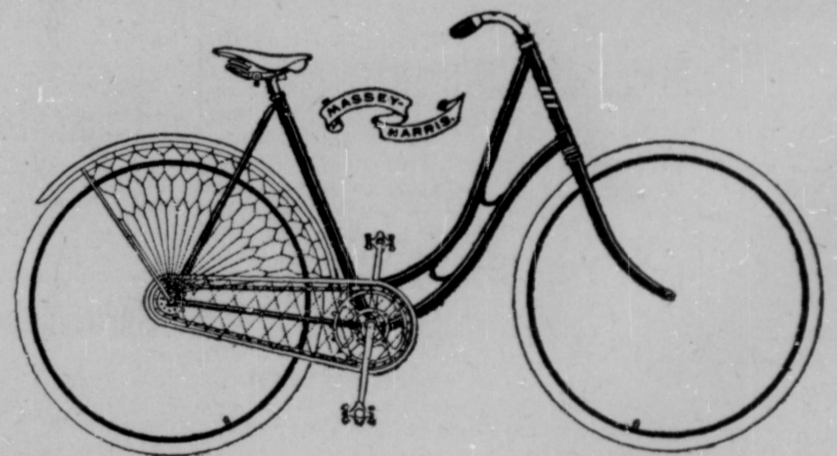
