FOR HALIFAX.—The Fastnet returned from Summerside this morning, and will leave for Halifax this afternoon at four o'clock. Her outward cargo will be made up mainly of oats, pork, lobsters, eggs and cheese, the principal shippers being Carvell Bros., N. E. & M. Rattenbury, D. A. W. McDonald, E. H. Norton & Co., Walter MacIsaac, Horner, Hazard, Geo. H. Tombs and David Davies. There are five passengers, not including several making the round trip.

MR. BAYFIELD'S BENEFIT.—The Bayfield benefit and farewell recital, booked for Sept. 6th, promises to be most interesting. Mr. Bayfield is to appear in a new role—as a dancer—first in a skit dance and again in the famous Spanish costume dance, for which a specially arranged monologue has been written. Spanish costumes have been designed and are in execution. Mr. Vimont, with his orchestra, have kindly volunteered their services on this occasion.

SCOTT ACT.—Last evening, John Wonnacott, Great George street, received an invitation to appear at the Police Court on Monday next to answer a charge of violating the Canada Temperance Act. This makes the fourteenth summons that has been served on persons suspected of violating the law since the act went into effect three weeks ago. Of these fourteen summonses one has been dismissed, in four cases convictions were obtained and the others have not yet been disposed of.

THEY BROKE THE CONTRACT.—It costs money to break an advertising contract. The Ayer Co. of Lowell, had an agreement with the late Norman L. Munro, for the distribution of 50,000,000 copies of the Family Story Paper, which was to contain an advertisement of the Ayer Company. Mr. Munro died when about one-sixth of the papers had been distributed. The executors abandoned the enterprise on account of the expense. The Ayer Company brought suit and will receive \$10,000 damages.

SEVERE DEATH.—The sudden death of Mrs. John Murphy, which occurred at her residence, Kent Street, yesterday afternoon, has cast a gloom over the community. Mrs. Murphy was in her usual health yesterday and took a walk at the usual hour. About two o'clock she was stricken with hemorrhage of the brain in her room and there one of her daughters found her almost unconscious shortly after. Medical aid was promptly summoned, and everything possible was done to relieve her. But the effort proved fruitless; a few minutes after five o'clock the end came. Mrs. Murphy was a daughter of the late Donald Mac-Anlay, of Tracadie, and was 46 years of age. She was noted for her kindness of heart and unostentatious charity, and her death is mourned by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. CHASED BY A BEAR.

Lela Mills, a bright, intelligent, thirteen-year-old daughter of Mr. John Mills, Little River, Lot 56, after coming home from school on Tuesday afternoon last, went to one of the back fields to gather "life of man" flowers, which are used sometimes in making pillows and cushions. She had gathered about half her sack full when she stopped to eat a cookie that she had brought with her when she gathered, and looking around was horrified to see right at her elbow a huge bear standing on his hind legs, grinning and ready to pounce on her. The cookie fell from her hand. The bear grabbed it, which gave the terrified girl a chance to run for her life. This she did, but bare, as soon as he had swallowed the cake, gave chase and soon overtook her. He made several grunts at her but she bravely kept on, striking him about the head and face with her stick. Screaming for help which did not come, as there happened to be no one near her at the time, she managed to keep ahead of the bear till she got nearly across the field, when he stopped. By this time she was nearing her home. For a moment on climbing a fence, she looked back, when the bear made another dash towards her but did not come a very great distance; then he suddenly turned and slunk away into the woods in the rear of the field and disappeared. When Lela got home she was very much frightened, but is now none the worse for her terrible experience. Her father and neighbors, with guns, went looking for him, but did not overtake him.
