Nieman, an ex-Tiger who is leading the American League in batting, slammed his second and third home runs in consecutive times at bat.

The Orioles, squaring their record at 13-13, jumped on starter Billy Hoelt for four runs in the early going. Hoelt was lifted in the third inning before he could retire a batter.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Vice President E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi of Los Angeles Dodgers said Tuesday he and Duke Snider have settled their differences. Or have they?
A photographer who tried to get the two together for the traditional hatchet-buried picture was met with veiled refusals.

"I talked with the Duke last night," said Bavasi, "and we straightened out our difficulties. I believe we understand each other."
Snider, who Bavasi accused of indifference in the face of a .225 batting average and five RBIs, could not be reached for comment.

A few of his teammates, who previously had warned away the photographer, told a sports writer the Duke was out for a stroll or maybe to a movie.
BAVASI OPENS FIRE
The skirmish of syllables began Monday when Bavasi, obviously nettled by the performance to date of the Dodgers' biggest batting threat, said Snider should be ashamed of himself.

"I can't understand the Duke," Bavasi said. "He has all the talent in the world but he doesn't seem to want to apply it to baseball. Maybe he ought to try something else."
Bavasi said he had no thought of trading Snider, perhaps the biggest disappointment of the last-place team in the National League.

The Duke, still bothered by the left knee he reinjured in an auto accident this spring, Monday night said:
"If he (Bavasi) has a beef," he said, "why doesn't he come to see me about it before talking to some writers. When I have a good left leg again, I'll hit. Um, then, I'll do the best I can. I that's not good enough, then that's too bad."

Landy Asks IAAF To Define Mile

MELBOURNE (AP)—The International Amateur Athletic Federation will have to work out a proper definition of a paced mile, John Landy said Tuesday.

The Australian star, holder of the recognized world record for the distance and now retired, was interviewed at his family's farm, 20 miles south of Melbourne. He posed the question: "Just what is the definition of a paced mile?"

The difficulty, which dates back to 1954 when Roger Bannister first cracked the four-minute barrier and has been periodically revived, bobbed up again when Herb Elliott was timed in 3:57.8 in the mile at Los Angeles last Friday. The best time to date, still unofficial, is Derek Ibbotson's 3:57.2.

"There will always be trouble over these miles until the federation lays down a definite rule," Landy added "but how are they going to arrive at that definition, I don't know."
DON'T CASTING SUSPICION
"Don't, please, for a minute think I'm casting any suspicions about Ibbotson's or Elliott's times to safeguard my own record."

"As far as I'm concerned I've finished with running and I'm the ex-world record holder. I think Derek's time should and will be recognized. This will make him faster than any other man, and any time between my 3:58 and his 3:57.2 will be out."

"It seems that if anyone is in front at any time of the race apart from the actual winner it could be said he was paced. It is all right to say a runner should go all out from the start and remain in front, but how many can do it?"
"Any runner who has to do that would be just running himself into the ground."

Loren Babe To Red Wings

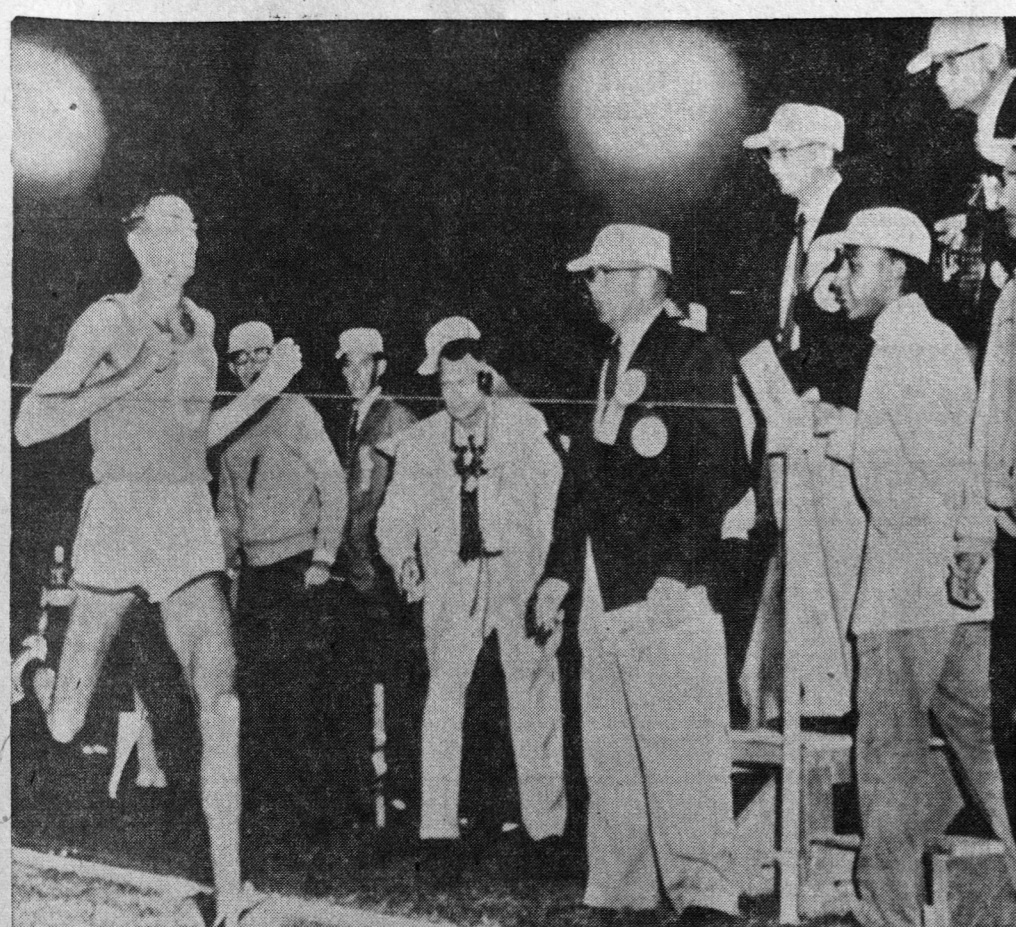

Is there no stopping that old man, Satchel Paige? There was a time that Old Satch was called in to do some fancy relief hurling but that stage seems passed with Miami Marlins. Paige is one of the starters these days and making a mighty nifty job of it.

His most recent triumph came Sunday when he three-hit Columbus as the Marlins won 4-1. Age doesn't seem to bother this fellow as he just kept rolling along.
How old is he? Well nobody seems to know with any amount of accuracy, but it's safe to bet that Satchel is well past the half-century mark.

The old fellow was stopped the other day but it wasn't on the ball diamond. It was a traffic cop that did the job. Old Satch got a 20-day sentence but there were a few strings to the sentence. The judge agreed he would knock off a day every time Paige struck out Luke Easter of the Buffalo Bisons, scored a run or won a game.

We have no way of knowing how he did with Easter or how his hitting is coming. One thing we do know that the sentence is already down to 18 days after a 2-1 victory over Havana and his latest 4-1 triumph over Columbus.

When is this old man going to stop?

Jimmy Dykes, one of baseball's most versatile performers and outstanding third baseman on Connie Mack's great team, it claims light bats hold the key to the heavy hitting of today. It appears that the 62-year-old coach of Cincinnati Redlegs would use a lighter bat if he had to do it over again.

"It isn't the lively ball but the lighter bat that is responsible for today's slugging," Jimmy said between pulls on his cigar.
"We were just too smart for our own good—almost all of us, including Babe Ruth. Sure, Babe Ruth was impressive even when he struck out. But today's hitters don't strike out so often, because they have better control of their bat. And they have better control because they have a lighter bat. They get better wrist action and they can judge a pitch up to the last split second."

Dykes is a fellow that should know what he is talking about and a look at the bats of the world champion Milwaukee Braves proves his point. The sluggers that made Milwaukee the baseball capital of the world favor 33 ounce bats. Even the heavy hitters like Eddie Mathews and Henry Aaron and the big guys like Joe Adcock and Wes Covington stick to that weight despite the fact that the rules place no restriction on the size of the bat except that it not be longer than 42 inches. One exception is Red Schoendienst, who uses bats weighing anywhere from 36 to 40 ounces, but the switch hitting veteran sometimes saws off the knob and always chokes up on his grip. The other hitters swing from the handle.

Milwaukee's formula seems very satisfactory. Nobody will argue too much on that score. You just can't beat success.
There's been a great deal of talk about the Los Angeles Dodgers going to set a new National League attendance record this season. That may be but at the moment it is by no means certain. Their bid is strictly touch and go. After 19 home games they are averaging 30,384 and that's fine. But it isn't enough.

At the pace they're drawing they will finish with 1,236,380 for the season—and that's a little less than 100,000 below Milwaukee's record last year.

Of course there are a few things still in the Dodgers' favor. The Braves have 11 appearances to make out there and the hated Giants have six. These games will pack them in. The first Milwaukee series, in fact, is already a sellout in reserved seats. The three games (June 6, 7 and 8) will draw close to 200,000.

Another fact also favors the former Brooks. They can't be as bad as they've looked. They'll start to climb some day and when they do it will help greatly at the gate.
