

Business Men Opposed To Use Of Trading Stamps Here

Unanimous support to the opposition of trading stamps and that they be kept out of P.E.I. was voiced at a meeting of retailers and businessmen of P.E.I. held at City Hall last evening.

Mr. D.A. Gilbert, immediate past president and general manager of the Retail Merchants Association of Canada, Inc., and F. Arnold B. Rands, General Manager of the National Foods Division of the R.M.A., addressed the meeting.

They were accompanied by J.D. Poole of Woodstock, Ont. President of the National Foods Division and E.G. Justin, Maritime Field Manager both of whom also spoke briefly. The meeting, which

was well attended, was presided over by J. Fulton Pierce. "Trading stamps are not in the interest of the economy of the country," Mr. Gilbert said in speaking on the subject. Their use is now being investigated by the Province of Ontario and we are asking Ottawa to clarify the Criminal Code in respect to use of stamps. Mr. Gilbert went on to say that trading stamps were a levy tribute on the retail trade to be handed on to the consumers. Their essential nature is to make profits at the expense of the retailer and the consumer. "We do not approve of any trading stamp schemes—they are a lure diverting the customer from his purchase to the stamps."

Stressing the high pressure use of stamps which has in the Ottawa valley reached huge proportions and has done nothing to increase sales for anyone, because practically all firms are in it, he condemned this method of attempting to get business as being direct.

Addresses Rotarians On Importance Of Militia

"The efficiency of our National Defence largely depends on the Militia," Brigadier J.R.B. Jones, D.S.O., O.B.E., C.D., Commander of the New Brunswick Area said in addressing a luncheon meeting of Rotarians at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"We are living in a sick world with fear, mistrust and uncertainty predominating. We must accept responsibilities if we are to hold the traditions for which our comrades died—Freedom and Liberty," he said.

Brigadier Jones, speaking with authority as a former miner and mining engineer, described the cumulative conditions under which a disaster such as took place at Springhill comes to a head. Using this step-by-step example he drew a picture of world conditions which can be set off by a minute spark and develop into a dire catastrophe.

"Without training the draughtmen would be powerless to shear up falls, clear blocks and do the innumerable things necessary to save lives in such a disaster. Similarly the regular Army and the Militia must be trained for their

job and be ready for any situation which may develop. If not trained, it will be too late when the spark sets off the accumulation," he said. "If we are strong, the militia can collectively play a part in looking after the peace of the world."

Brigadier Jones made an appeal for sympathetic support in securing leaders who are badly needed in all services. He described the training available to young men which will make them disciplined, with a respect for law and good citizens generally.

After recalling a stirring story of action in World War II in which Mayor J.D. Stewart was the central figure, he concluded with complimentary remarks regarding the Militia. "You have remarkable Militia here of which you may well be proud. The three branches attending my camp last summer were excellent, and I have doubt the signals who were not with us, were equally as efficient."

The speaker was introduced by Mayor MacGillivray and thanked by Gordon Kerr.

Brigadier Jones, who was appointed Commander New Brunswick Area in 1954, served as Chief Engineer at Army Headquarters, Ottawa. He was educated at the Royal Military College and the University of Alberta. He served overseas with the 8th Canadian Armoured Division Engineers and later in North Africa with British Divisions.

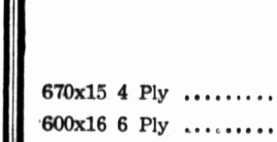
