# Traveler travels Extra Distance To Avoid Ice

## Possession Case Results In \$20 Fine

Perced more than 600 miles of course because of ice conditions, the Imperial Halifax Tanker, on a journey from Dartmouth, N.S. to Imperial Oil's Charlottetown depot, was forced to travel an extra 100 miles to avoid the first tanker contact of the spring with the mainland.

The tanker, carrying 1,500,000 gallons of cargo composed of gasoline, stove oil, diesel fuel and kerosene, was forced to within 10 miles of Port aux Basques because of moving ice, and had to make the trip around P.E.I.'s North Cape.

The vessel will return to Halifax after unloading and come back to Charlottetown under Captain Kearney for Imperial Oil's second tanker trip of the season.

An Irving Oil official yesterday reported the company tanker, Irvington, was due in Saint John yesterday and if plans permitted as scheduled she would leave for the Island some time last evening.

The Irvington's travelling depends upon the ice conditions in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Everything from the Magdalen Islands to the coast of Cape Breton is being watched by a company official said.

Smaller tankers, the Hickory and the Hemlock, were also received after the Irvington has arrived in Charlottetown.

Wilson County district manager for Irving Oil, said that for the first part of the shipping season, Irvington will continue to use the discharge berth at the Railway Wharf.

Let fall the company had been hopeful that the four 10-inch pipe lines from their new pier, built under the Hillboro Bridge, could have been laid on the ice. This was found to be impracticable because the ice was not firm enough.

Mr. Connolly said the plan now is to get the pipelaying started as soon as possible while the river ice is clearing out. This will limit working periods to when there are low tides.
