The board of directors for the Protestant Family Service Bureau, at its monthly meeting, held Tuesday evening in the Dominion Building, decided to establish an endowment fund with the recent bequest of \$1,000 from the Coles estate.

The board felt that looking to the future and the anticipated development of the bureau and its services, it is advisable to have such a fund as a future source of supplementary income.

K.A. Parker, former vice-president of the board, who was recently appointed to complete the term of former president Alfred Zait, presided at the meeting and outlined some of the problems with which the board is faced. One of the problems is the need of a definite and adequate plan of financing. A committee was appointed to study the matter and be prepared to report at the January meeting.
