THE BRUNSWICK BERTH.—A year ago we called attention to a self-leveling berth, so constructed that the occupant always remained on a level independent of the roll or pitch of a vessel. The inventor, Mr. Dana Parks of Boston, and Mr. Fred. H. Sawyer, of the Worcester, to-day afforded us an opportunity to examine into the merits of the new improvements, and the mechanical effects of itself so called our appreciation that we take pleasure in congratulating Mr. Parks, being able to give the ocean travelling public a quiet rest upon the billowy deep. It would be difficult to give an elaborate explanation of the ingenious mechanism by which this berth is constructed as to look at it on board the steamer Worcester; nothing is seen of the working gear which is all covered up and out of sight. Our opinion is fully corroborated by the officers of the ship who have thoroughly tested the merits of the berth, and who take much interest in the new improvements of Mr. Parks.

A GREAT REGATTA PROMISED IN TORONTO.—The regatta of Toronto day, in connection with the Exhibition of 1881, will be quite an important affair. The money prizes aggregate \$1,500, and, in addition, the winner of the single scull race will receive an elegant gold medal from the Mayor of the city. The single scull race will be rowed in heats, the trials to occur on Wednesday, and the final heat between winners of the trials on the following day. The purse is \$2,475, of which the winner gets \$1,500 and second gets \$900. Haulan has signified his determination to start against all-comers, and Ross, Hooper, Tricklett, Kennedy, Gaultier, Ten Eyck and Riley will be in. An effort will be made to revive four-oar shell racing, and, with that end in view, a purse of \$900 has been offered, of which \$800 goes to the winning crew and \$100 to the second four. This race will also be rowed on the first day of the regatta. There ought to be at least one four-oar shell crew from Boston in the race, and Hooper, the Gookins and another good man would undoubtedly make a creditable showing, even should they fail to be winners. Ross, Kennedy, Davis and a fourth man (either Blaised or Ten Eyck) will in all probability be among the entries—indeed, four crews must start or but two prizes will be awarded, and if only three start there will be only two prizes. Should only two crews start the race will be declared "off." On the second day there will be a double-scull race for a purse of \$800, and also a consolation race for oarsmen who fail to win in the single-scull event. An entrance fee of \$70 will be charged for fours, \$20 for doubles and \$10 for singles, to be returned to all starters. The distance in the four-oar race will be four miles with a turn; in the single-scull race, three miles with a turn; and in the double-scull race, three miles with a turn. The event is fixed for September 7th and 8th, and entries will be received up to August 25th.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, Aug. 2. The executive Committee of the National Fair Trade League have issued a programme favoring protection.

The second reading of the Land Bill has been adopted in the House of Lords.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 2. The jury found McGrath guilty as accessory before the fact in connection with the explosion at the Police Office in May last. McGrath was sentenced to penal servitude for life and McKeivitt for fifteen years.

DUBLIN, Aug. 2. Parnell was present at a meeting of the Land League to-day, and announced that the League would hold a national convention in Dublin on the 15th September, to consider the best means of obtaining Irish land for Irishmen. He advised tenants not to trust to the Land Bill.

At a meeting of the Land League to-night, Parnell said it would be the duty of the League to select test cases in different parts of Ireland to see what the land commissioners are going to do, and how much they are going to lower the rents. That would be the crucial test, he said, whereby the working of the Bill would stand or fall.

BERLIN, Aug. 2. The authorities are trying to find the author of the letter addressed to Bismarck.

St. PETERSBURG, Aug. 2. It is reported on good authority that the commission for reviving the extraordinary measures against the Nihilists, introduced since 1878, has finished its labors and recommends the rescission of the measures.

MUNICH, Aug. 2. Throughout Upper Bavaria a dangerous disease has appeared in Deer Parks. Hundreds of deer have perished. The disease is spreading to cattle.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. The Postmaster General having discovered that numbers of United States mail bags sent to Canadian post offices are not returned to this country, ordered an investigation, which showed that for several years the Dominion Government has been using mail pouches belonging to the United States. Our inspectors discovered several of them at St. John, Halifax, Montreal, Quebec and other points. Plans providing for the return hereafter, of this property to the United States, have been approved by the postal authorities of both governments.

The Government has got no official information of the arrest of any persons connected with the shipments of infernal machines.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2. Ambrose Lomprax, of Natchitoches, La., has arrived in this city from Mexico. He was with the party of surveyors that were attacked by Apaches south of El Paso, in Chihuahua, and thirteen were killed.

Lomprax says the Indians, numbering 45, were commanded by Victoria. The surveyors fought desperately, killing six and wounding nine Indians. Lomprax and a boy were taken prisoners, but Lomprax finally escaped.

DYERSBURG, Tenn., Aug. 2. Mike Wells, colored, attempted an outrage upon Mrs. J. F. O'Neil, a widow, yesterday, but was frightened away by her shrieks. He was tried and arrested, confessed, and was hanged by the citizens.

PEORIA, Ill., Aug. 2. Since the explosion at the Wooster distillery on Saturday, ten men in all have died; four more will probably die, leaving but four who may recover. Nearly all inhaled the escaping steam and their sufferings were intense. The verdict of the coroner's jury was that the explosion was caused by unnecessary pressure of steam in the still.

TUCSON, Aug. 2. A party of Mexican raiders on the way from the interior of Sonora, Mexico, were ambushed by cow boys, on July 26, near Las Animas, while eating breakfast. Five Mexicans, it is supposed, were killed; the rest fled, leaving a pack train and \$4,000. Mexican troops are said to be in pursuit of the cow boys.

PEORIA, Ill., Aug. 2. P. W. Cowe, of this city, mentioned in connexion with the attempt to blow up the British vessels, openly confesses his knowledge of the plot and claims the same right to manufacture explosives that others have to make fire arms. He has letters from O'Donovan Rossa, and boasts that after September 1st no English vessel will be safe. Some of the shells are on exhibition, but there is nothing indicating that those already used were made here. It is thought the shells are being made here and the explosives and machinery elsewhere.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. Official bulletin, 8.30 a.m.—The President passed a very pleasant night. He slept sweetly the greater part of the time. This morning he awoke refreshed and appears comfortable and cheerful. Pulse 94, temperature 98-4, respiration 18.

DENVER, Aug. 2. Last night the Colorado Iron Works, with nearly all the machinery, was burned. Loss \$125,000.
