BIG WARNER MUSICAL, "TEA FOR TWO", DUE

"Tea for Two," from the studio that produced some of the greatest musical films the screen has ever seen through the years, from "42nd Street" to "Look for the Silver Lining," opens its local engagement at the Prince Edward Theatre on Thursday.

Starring Doris Day and Gordon MacRae, the Warner Bros. Technicolor extravaganza has been spared nothing in the way of production values, and the big numbers, gay tunes and beautiful chorus lines fill the screen, according to the glowing advance reports. The film also introduces two outstanding Broadway musical stars, Patrice Wymore and Virginia Gibson, fresh from recent successes on the New York stage.

Most of the hit songs in the film are handled by MacRae, as a singing composer, and Miss Day, in the role of a career-bent, helpless who loses her money in the stock market crash.

Gene Nelson, who won acclaim for his nimble footwork in "Rose O'Grady," is highlighted in an amazing staircase dance and unusual African rhythm number atop a huge drum, while comedians Billy De Wolfe and Eve Arden go through their respective routines to key the film's laughs. "Tea for Two" is set in the nostalgic 1929 period, and concerns a band of vaudevillians whose efforts to produce a show are hampered by the Wall Street panic. It's the events leading up to their finding a backer that makes for the romance and music that predominate in the story.

Among the songs heard are Oh Me! Oh My! Do, Do, Do, I Know That You Know, Crazy Rhythm, I Want To Be Happy, then, No, No, Nanette and title song number, Tea for Two.

Around The Armouries

When Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse officially opens the coming session of the Provincial Legislature he will see drawn up one of the largest Guards of Honour ever formed here for that purpose.

Over 100 men, all ranks, will form the Guard which is annually a colorful part of the ceremonies. The selected unit is already undergoing training for the event and should present a keenly smart appearance.

Tonight is the big event of the pre-Lenten season for the Garrison N.C.O.'s. It is the first of the 1951 Mess dances and is expected to be a gala evening. It is also the first Mess dance to be held in the Armouries since the new quarters were unveiled last autumn.

There were two appointments announced by the P. E. I. Regiment during the past week. Lieut. Pete Ford has been named Transport Officer and ESM. Warren Farrar has been named manager of the hockey team which plays in the Garrison Hockey League.

Extra space will also be provided in the Band Room by the removal of the old canteen. The area now used will be opened up and a semi-circular serving counter installed at the entrance end. The canteen itself and the supplies will be housed in the former storage quarters.

The whole arrangement makes for far better conditions for the men and offers an ideal place for the proposed week-end entertainments.
