BIGWIN INN, Ont., (CP)—To get a job, improve your English—even if the job seems to call more for skilled hands than for a skilled tongue.

This advice, in effect, was given Monday by J. Emmert, of Windsor, Ont., in an address prepared for delivery to the annual convention of the Ontario Urban and Rural School Trustees Association.

Mr. Emmert, executive vice-president, Ford Motor Company of Canada, said the superintendent of Ford's trade school rejects any applicant with low marks in English, because he has found that use of sloppy English indicates a sloppy mind.

Lay Association to Meet in Kensington

—The twenty-third annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Lay Association will be held in Kensington United Church on July 7. There will be three sessions during the day, morning session opening at 10 a.m. Mr. J. R. D. Kierstead, Saint John N.B., will be the guest speaker for the day. The subject for discussion will be "The Need for Evangelism."

The annual conference was held in Kensington August 6, 1952, and there has been one of more conferences held every year since in different charges on the Island.

Both Sides Are Pleased With Washington Talks

WASHINGTON (Reuters)—An authoritative conference source confirmed Monday that the United States has accepted Britain's refusal to enter into early international negotiations for a Southeast Asian defence pact.

The phrase in the statement issued by Prime Minister Churchill and President Eisenhower after their weekend talks about their decision "to press forward" with defence plans referred only to further talks between the two governments about such an alliance, the source said.

The talks would be an extension and speeding up of the talks which have been in progress for some time about Asian defence. They would not be held at foreign minister level but by officials and military experts—a "natural progression" of the recent five-power staff talks in Washington.

By agreeing to hasten the planning of Asian defence, the United States has accepted Britain's long way to meeting the American anxiety to speed "united action" in Asia, the source said.

Officials of both sides are expressing satisfaction with the week-end talks which they regard as being extraordinarily successful in view of the bad atmosphere in which they opened.

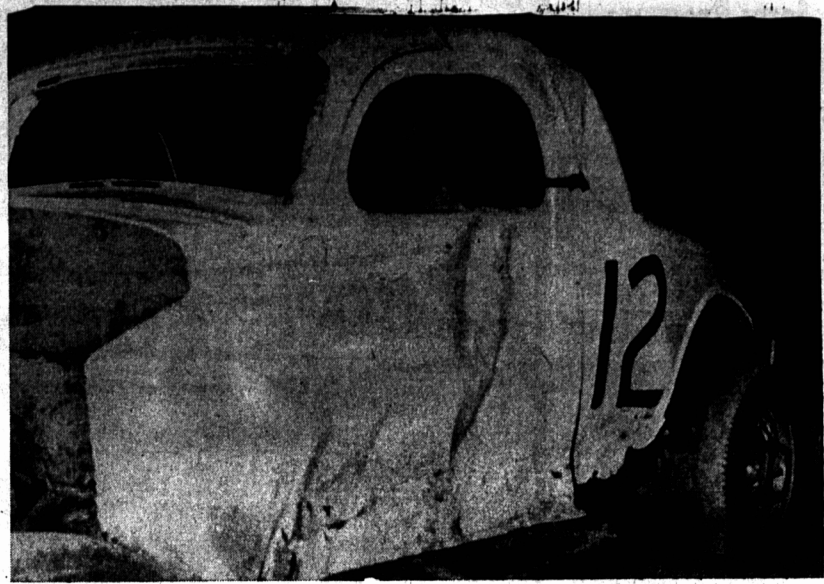

Expect Damage To Lobster Gear

—Strong easterly winds and high seas the past two days are expected to cause some loss of inshore lobster gear in the area between Alberton and North Cape with the possibility of much more serious losses if the present heavy swell continues throughout today. No boats were out at Alberton or Miramichi Shore yesterday but boats at Jude's Point overhauled part of their traps. This is the first serious storm since the lobster fishing season opened on the north side and the fishermen had been hoping to complete the season without suffering loss of traps as in previous years. The season closes June 30.

Special Meeting Of Town Council

—A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council will be held in the council chambers this evening to consider two significant matters which have been pending for some time. This evening's agenda includes discussions on the proposed additions to the high school and on the repairing of several of the town's paved streets and it is hoped a decision will be reached in both matters. In the latter, the town has asked the Provincial Government for assistance but so far no apparent decision has been reached. Tenders have already been received for street repairs but no contract has been let.
