Inferior Quality Spuds Found on Toronto Market

On the spot checking of island potatoes on Toronto markets has turned up "a few cases" of inferior products, provincial marketing director Red Sangster said yesterday.

"During my stay in Toronto," he said, "I was able to check on about 50 tubs for island potato and for the most part found that island growers are doing a good job in preparing their product for market."

"The exceptions I found in this were serious, however, and when these potatoes were traced back to their origin in this province they were found to come from a few small areas where not enough attention was given to the grading process."

"We are hopeful," said Mr. Sangster, "that in any effort to correct this quality problem everyone will co-operate since our real hope is to build our potato markets in the fact that we must produce what the market wants and good quality."

While in Ottawa, Mr. Sangster also attended a meeting of the Canadian Horticultural Council along with potato interests who attended the earlier meeting.

"Some persons connected with the potato industry," he said, "were pressing for changes in legislation, relative to size and grade standards, but no changes

that will affect the industry in as far as we are concerned were brought about."

POTATO PUBLICITY

Mr. Sangster spent some time at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto. "I was enthusiastic," he said, "over the response of crowds attending the fair to the potato booth set up by the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board. Island potatoes received a great deal of publicity, particularly since Ann Macaulay of Souris won the world seed potato championship."

"The effects of this, and also the efforts of others who display products and who prizes for the province, has helped greatly to stimulate interest in the island and its products."

Mr. Sangster said that the provincial potato marketing board should be commended for its efforts to improve island potatoes. He said "there is no way of measuring the actual good effect it had in the Toronto area as far as our products are concerned."

H-BOMB TALK STIRS STORM

LONDON (AP) — Julian Sandy, grandson of Sir Winston Churchill, has stirred up a storm by urging that one hydrogen bomb a day be dropped on the Communist Chinese and they withdraw from India.

Sandy, a 25-year-old prospective candidate for Parliament, is the son of Commonwealth Relations Secretary Duncan Sandy. He made his suggestion in a political speech last week before Peking announced its cease-fire.

"Our trump card is the H-bomb, which the Chinese have not got," Sandy said. "And my personal plan is to deliver an ultimatum to them that if they do not withdraw from India we will wipe out one city a day until they do."

The Daily Sketch commented editorially that when Duncan Sandy returns from India he should take his son aside and tell him "all over again the history of the nuclear age."

WASHINGTON (AP) — American officials reacted with caution to the proposals for UN inspection of military bases both inside and outside Cuba.

The U.S. officials also had an evening dinner meeting with Thant and a group of Soviet negotiators headed by Deputy Premier Mikoyan, just back from talks in Havana with Cuban officials.

U.S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson, special Cuban adviser Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr., and U.S. Ambassador Charles Wolf called on Thant Monday afternoon to give him the latest U.S. assessment on Cuban developments.

Mikoyan told reporters on the sidelines of the meeting that the agreement reached between President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Khrushchev on removal of Soviet weapons from Cuba opens up the possibility of improved U.S.-Cuban relations.

Supplementary Estimates Are Tabled in Commons

OTTAWA (CP) — Supplementary estimates for a total of \$1,000,000 are tabled in the Commons Monday by Finance Minister Norman Macdonald.

Of the money for technical training, \$1,000,000 is earmarked for training of unemployed workers.

Another big item is \$5,500,000 in federal subsidies for shipbuilding, on top of the \$10,000,000 in supplementary estimates the government in its main spending budget for the year.

FOOD DONATION COVERED

More than \$5,000,000 in additional spending is authorized in the supplementary estimates for the agriculture department, including the first \$4,000,000 to be spent by the new Agricultural Rehabilitation and Development Act.

Canada's initial contribution of \$1,000,000 to the United Nations world food program is also covered in the supplementary spending estimates.

He added expenditures proposed by Mr. Nowlan Monday still leaves the total for this year below the \$6,500,000 in supplementary estimates authorized by the minister Oct. 22.

However, further supplementary estimates are inevitable before the end of the fiscal year.

Safe And Dry Located

The recovery of a safe taken from the Capitol Theatre, and the arrest of an East Royal resident was reported early this morning by Deputy Police Chief Stevens Webster.

The small 150-pound safe was removed from the office of the city's only theatre sometime between 10:30 Sunday night and 7:30 Monday morning. It was reported to have contained approximately \$1,000 in cash and cheques. A large portion of the money was also recovered.

The deputy Police Chief reported that the safe had been found, following a continuous 15 or 18 hour investigation, on the site of the robbery presented by the old airport property about one mile north of the causeway and east of the North River.

In addition to the one man arrested, and who is scheduled to appear before Magistrate A.S. Hadam this morning, Deputy Webster stated that further arrests would be made.

At his preliminary investigation yesterday morning, the deputy, stated that there was no evidence of a break and entry. The site of the robbery presented the appearance that the thieves had remained in the building following a movie showing held Sunday evening.

After the building was vacated, the burglar apparently cut off the safe down from the second floor office and out into the street, which can be opened from the inside without a key.

The theft was discovered by theatre employees at about 7:45 yesterday morning.

Working on the case with the deputy were Constables Charles Reedy, Davison Bigger and Douglas Taylor.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker called for reform of Parliament to conduct business with more dispatch.

He suggested longer sitting hours, shorter question periods, and a one-hour limit on debates on individual measures.

Supplementary spending estimates of \$148,134,374 were tabled by Finance Minister Norman Macdonald.

Harold Winch (NDP—Vanouver East) said he was "disgusted" with Canadian inaction on the Cuban missile crisis.

Many of the items in Monday's supplementary estimates are to cover increased costs of existing government programs, including \$2,250,000 for year-over-year increases.

Other major expenditures covered in the list included: \$786,000 to the St. Lawrence Seaway to cover its operating deficits; \$87,708 for various subsidies of coastal steamer services; \$260,000 in national welfare grants; and \$200,000 as Canada's contribution to the International Pacific Halibut Commission.

Prime Minister Diefenbaker said the fiscal year ends Tuesday, Nov. 27.

The Commons meets at 2:30 p.m. on a routine debate on an interim Monday supply bill. The Senate meets at 3 p.m.

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Demolition Of Bridge Is Planned

OTTAWA — A supplementary estimate of \$20,000 for the demolition of the Hillborough Bridge is included in a number of supplementary estimates tabled in the Commons Monday by Finance Minister George Mealy.

The amount is being made for railway and steamship services under the department of transport and has been broken up into three categories.

One is for termination of the obligation of the province of the agreement made on April 18, 1960 between the then minister of railways and the province and the premier and commissioner of public works of P.E.I.

The second item is for the demolition and removal by or on behalf of the province of the bridge over the Hillborough River, referred to in the agreement.

The third item is for such other matters as the government-in-council considers appropriate.

Woman Is Tabbed In Secrets Probe

LONDON (Reuters) — A senior woman official of the British central office of information has been summoned under the provisions of the Official Secrets Act, it was learned Monday night.

Two summonses have been issued under the act, which appear in a magistrate's court here Wednesday.

Mariner Heard Deep In Space

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mariner II has established a long distance communication link by beaming a radio report to earth from 23,800,000 miles out in space, according to U.S. scientists.

The mark was set Sunday as the 447,000-mile probe continued its flight toward the planet Venus.

It was also announced last night that Cyril Williams, Ellsworth's chief scientist, as general chairman for the Ellerslie area.

Fire Destroys Catholic Church
