CHANGE OF UNIFORM.—It is understood that among the changes to be made in the uniform of the British army are the following:—The tunics are to be made after a different pattern; turned up collars and cuffs are to be abolished, and the colors of the regiment will be shown by a narrow cord around the collar and wrist. The sergeants will not carry muskets, but will wear swords and each carry a pair of Adams' army service seven shooter revolvers. This last change is made because sergeants have always to do a good deal of running about, and are incommoded by the heavy muskets.

A young man of twenty-one, named Boyer, lately drawn into the army conscription at Beaume, in France, was in despair at the thought of being separated for five years from a young sewing girl to whom he was betrothed, and retired with her to Verjus, on the river Soane, where they agreed to drown themselves.
