Gov. Romney Declares U.S. Playing Into Hands Of Reds

NEW YORK (AP) — Governor George Romney of Michigan said at The Associated Press annual luncheon Monday the United States, by calling its system capitalistic, is playing into the hands of Communist "pit-men."

Actually, the system now is "consumerism" — controlled by the people in the marketplace, Romney told more than 1,350 newspaper executives and their wives.

He said Americans buried capitalism long ago, but that most of them "are still talking about our 20th-century economy in 19th-century terms."

Romney said former Soviet premier Khrushchev played on this repeatedly during his visit to the U.S.

"We still call it a capitalistic system," said the potential con-

tender for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination. "But how many of us, I wonder, know the definition of capitalism?"

CITES DEFINITION

Romney cited several dictionary definitions, such as "the concentration of capital, as when in the hands of the few."

He said: "Around the world capitalism is usually considered as an economic system in which the economy is controlled by the few—in which the few benefit from the efforts of the many."

"The genius of our consumeristic system is that ultimate control has rested with the many, through the free and daily economic balloting of customers in the marketplace."

"Lack of understanding of our economic principles not only holds back progress here as

home, but it plays right into the hands of our enemies abroad. When we tell people of the world our system is capitalistic we are telling them just exactly what our enemies want them to hear. In the battle for men's minds, we make the job of a Communist pitchman just that much easier."

Romney said present Soviet leaders, no less than Khrushchev, believe communism will bury capitalism as capitalism buried feudalism.

"But what they do not understand—and what we have failed to tell the world—is that Americans buried capitalism long ago and moved on to consumerism, which is a higher form of economic organization."

Communism, he said, is nothing but a return to feudalism in modern nationalistic dress.

MEETING HELD

Radhakrishnan arrived from London where he had undergone an eye operation. He was returning to New Delhi.

5,000 ELIGIBLE

Potato Plebiscite Vote Is Wednesday

Approximately 5,000 registered potato growers of P.E.I. are eligible to vote Wednesday in the potato plebiscite which asks simply if the grower is in favor of the temporary plan under which the present P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board was established late in 1963.

It was previously promised that the growers of the province would have an opportunity to vote on it within a period of 18 months. That's the reason for the plebiscite this week.

The growers, they must be registered with the board—will vote in the polling district in which they reside, and the polls will be at or near the regular polling place which is used in provincial and federal elections.

Unlike the regular elections, though, growers who are 18 years or older will be eligible to vote in this plebiscite. The requirement is that the grower must have attained his 18th birthday by polling day, April 21.

MUST SIGN

Strangely enough every grower must sign an affidavit before he or she receives a ballot as set forth in the following paragraph:

"Before receiving a ballot all voters will be required to sign a declaration which will have the same force and effect as if made under oath." And this is required although another section of printed instructions states flatly: "Voters must be registered producers with the Prince Edward Island potato marketing board."

Two Held For Theft Of \$11,000

MONCTON (CP) — RCMP held two men and about \$11,000 in cash and cheques Sunday after safe breaks at a Riverview Shopping Centre early Saturday.

Police said the men were apprehended near the Pine Glen Road, about three miles from the breaks, at 1 p.m. Saturday.

A large safe in Jackson's Supermarket and a smaller one in the adjoining Ford's Pharmacy were torn open, and some \$7,000 in cash and \$4,000 in cheques taken. Most of the loot was stolen from the larger supermarket safe.

With the aid of a police dog, RCMP arrested the pair in woods near the Pine Glen Road. No further details of the capture were disclosed.

Police said they plan to charge the two men in Albert County magistrate's court Tuesday morning at Riverview.
