Monitors and Torpedo Boats.
A monitor is a peculiar battleship,
having a low freeboard, light draft and
flush deck and guns mounted in heavy-
ly armored revolving turrets placed on
the deck. A monitor is a floating bat-
tery more than a ship and derives its
name from the first of the class ever
constructed, which battled with the
Confederate ironclad Merrimac in
Hampton Roads. The original Monitor
was described as resembling a great
cheesebox on a plank, but it did val-
uable service and revolutionized naval
warfare.

Torpedo boats are the racers among
the war vessels. They are swift, small
craft, designed to launch torpedoes near
large vessels. In order to do its work
properly the torpedo boat must go close
to the object of its destructive designs,
and having placed the instrument of
destruction in position its next object
is to get away and out of the reach of
the enemy. A torpedo boat must be
small, and the men who form its small
crew must be absolutely fearless.

A torpedo boat catcher is designed
expressly to catch or to destroy torpedo
boats. In order to be fitted for the work
the boats are larger than the torpedo
boats. They can make better time and
carry heavier armament

Vicious Bluefish.
The greatest enemy to the best spe-
cies of fish is found in the vicious, vo-
racious and dangerous bluefish. In size
ordinarily as long as your arm, with
teeth like barbs, he can snap in halves
a fish of his own size, and nearly all
fish stand in mortal dread of him. Gen-
erally traveling in schools—sometimes
as much as five miles in length—they
will in short order decimate a school of
shad, spot, menhaden or such like. In
his stomach can be found numbers of
smaller fish, according to size.

We have opened one which contained
a trout of almost his own size, while
another contained a shad nearly as
large. Still others are found having
within themselves one or more of their
own species of smaller size. But their
destructiveness does not end here. We
have seen them behind a school of shad,
spot or menhaden, and sometimes schools
of mackerel and cod, snapping and
slashing their prey until the water was
all a-foam. They eat until they can hold
no more, but their viciousness is not
abated. With a snap a shad is sundered
and spit out, and the next shares the
same fate. They never tire, and the fish
destroyed, but unbeaten, cover the sur-
face of the water.—Exchange.

TRIALS OF A PUBLIC MAN.

It Takes Time to Get Used to the Ways
of Newspaper Correspondents.
A new member of the senate was
complaining to an old member of some
of the difficulties he was encountering.

straight. I don't mean to accuse them
of carelessness or of intentional misrep-
resentation, but now and then some re-
markable stories are printed about me
at home."

SPAIN'S CROWN JEWELS.

Brought to America by the Secretary of
Joseph Bonaparte.

"In 1817 Joseph Bonaparte's secre-
tary, Maillard, left Philadelphia armed
with letters which represented him to
be a traveling agent for Girard's com-
mercial house and visiting Girard's cor-
respondents in Holland and Switzer-
land." William Perrine writes of
"When the King of Spain Lived on the
Banks of the Schuylkill" (in Philadel-
phia) in The Ladies' Home Journal.
"His real destination was the Swiss
chateau at Prangins, from which the
king had fled two years before, and his
real object to secure the treasure which
had been buried in the ground of the
estate on the eve of his flight. Maillard
found the buried packets, and with
them he would also have brought to
Philadelphia Queen Julie if her physi-
cians had not compelled her to renounce
the project of joining her husband."

"The jewels, which were valued at
\$1,000,000, were stuffed into a belt,
which Maillard wore on his person
when returning across the Atlantic, and
with which he was gladly received by
his master in the Lansdowne house,
near Philadelphia. It was about this
time that wild rumors began to circu-
late in Philadelphia concerning the ex-
king's riches and of the hoards of specie
which he had deposited in the vault of
Stephen Girard's Philadelphia bank.
Mysterious heavy boxes, sealed with
wax, were believed by Girard's clerks
to contain the crown jewels of Spain
and Naples. One or two old men in re-
cent years, who were then among those
clerks, have told how Joseph would sit
in the bank talking with them affably
while waiting for the great banker."
