Editorial Notes.

Co-Education doesn't give mutual satisfaction in the Medical College at Kingston. The gentlemen students have sent in a communication to the effect that if the ladies are not requested to withdraw they will not return to the college after the Christmas holidays.

Sir Hugh Allan was a model of commercial integrity. During a half century he never failed to meet his obligations. In this respect his example should have a stimulating effect upon all engaged in the commerce of the country.

He was the President of the Vale Coal, Iron and Manufacturing Company, and a director in the Acadia Coal Company; President of the Thunder Bay Silver Mining Company; President of the Canadian Rubber Company; President of the Cornwall Manufacturing Company; President of the Montreal Cotton Company; a director in the Stormont Cotton Company; President of the Williams Manufacturing Company; Vice-President of the Montreal Rolling Mills Company; a director in the Canada Paper Company; President of the Adam's Tobacco Company; a director in the Ontario Car Company; President of the Provincial Loan Company; a director in the Montreal Elevating Company; President of the Academy of Music Company; President of the St. Lawrence and Chicago Forwarding Company; President of the Montreal and Western Land Company; President of the North Western Cattle Company; President of the Merchants' Bank; President of the Montreal Telegraph Company; President of the Halifax and Cape Breton Railway and Coal Company; President of the Citizens' Insurance Company; President of the Canada and Newfoundland Sealing and Fishing Company, and for many years President of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company.

CANNO, Dec. 13. The brig "Zinga," for Liverpool, G. B., is ashore on Cape Canso, and is full of water. The schooner "Nava," from Charlotte-town, with potatoes for Boston, is ashore at Sandy Beach. She is in a safe position.

The Halifax Blind Asylum.

There are at present upon the roll of the Asylum 24 pupils, 17 of whom are from the Province of Nova Scotia, 5 from New Brunswick, and 2 from this Island. The Treasurer's report submitted at the annual meeting held on Saturday, shows that the total receipts during the year have been \$6945.54 and the total expenditure has been \$7026.81—a balance to the debit of \$80.27.

A FIRM OF EMINENT CONTRACTORS TO UNDERTAKE THE WORK.—THE SCHEME PRONOUNCED FEASIBLE.

Ketchum, Chief Engineer of the Chignecto Ship Railway scheme, has been in Ottawa, to submit the result of his operations thus far to the Government. The surveys have been obtained, the total distance being only seventeen miles.
