OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian economy is expanding at such a pace that some federal officials are becoming concerned over the possibility of another round of inflation gripping the country.

The government generally has been following a policy of making it easier for Canadians to borrow money and buy goods on more generous credit terms.

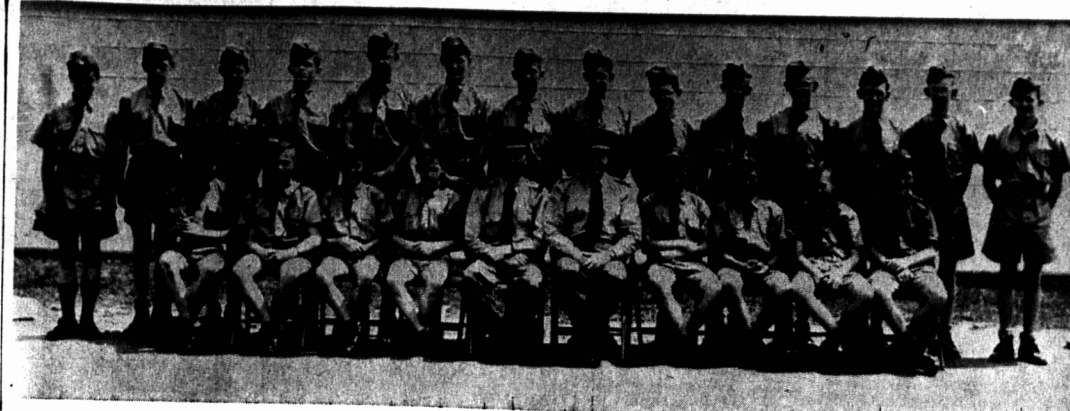
**INTEREST RATE LOW**

## Timely Notes On Fur Farming

At a meeting of Canada Mink Breeders held in Toronto a policy governing mink auctions was set. Though preferring to maintain last year's minimum quantities of qualifying skins as the prerequisite for the sponsored sale, auction companies agreed to accept the CMB marketing board's recommendation that a minimum of 5,000 skins be set for sponsored dark mink sales against 7,500 skins minimum when inaugurated last season. These dark goods of qualifying quality now will be auctioned for the first time this coming season under the newly acquired trade mark "Majestic." On sponsored CMB sales for EMBA mink the minimum per sale quantity is set at 10,000 skins. An estimated 103,305 pelts were offered in CMB sponsored dark mink sales last season.

**Pig Iron, Steel Output Higher**  
OTTAWA (CP)—Production of pig iron and steel increased during July compared with the corresponding months last year, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

Pig iron output rose to 275,729 tons from 200,763 and steel ingots and castings to 384,614 tons from 249,290.

Pig iron production in the first three months of the year totalled 690,268 tons compared with 597,812 in the corresponding period last year and of steel ingots and castings 1,022,665 tons compared with 715,101.

## NEWSY NOTES

**HORNETS**  
The true hornet is a European wasp (Vespa crabro). In America the term is applied to almost any form of the large stinging wasp that builds a paper nest. There are 1500 known species of wasps in North America. The Vespidæ (wasp) family includes 10,000 species and many of them feed on other insects. This family have a head sheath that is square; their anterior wings, when at rest, are folded longitudinally once; each being doubled on itself down the middle; its eggshaped abdomen is an entrance and, as they swoop, the female antenna has 12 joints with scarcely any thickening of the joint.

Our white faced hornet (Vespa maritima) builds a large oval grayish paper nest, which usually has several loose covering layers, with an entrance near the lower end. These nests are frequently seen attached to the branches of a thorn tree or to raspberry canes.

Hornets and yellow jackets are brightly striped with yellow on a black or brown ground color. They are the largest and most highly developed of the "paper-makers" or social wasps which live in colonies, and have a wonderful insect organization somewhat similar to the honey bee. There are three kinds: the male, the female and the neuter (workers). In a hornet's nest these last two have venomous stings.

In temperate climates the fertile queen hornet is the only one that survives the winter. She awakens from her torpor or dormant state early in the spring and sec's out a site for a new nest. From masticated vegetable matter and wood scrapings she works up a paste with a saliva secretion and starts an umbrella-like roof of paper.

Instead of the dowels chrome-plated wire is used. A hand-powered pin drill may be used for making the small holes for the wires but a small power drill would speed up the job.
