SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Disastrous Fire. CHICAGO, April 13. The most disastrous fire which has occurred in this city since 1871 occurred last night. The destroyed property is in the centre of the city. The amount burned is valued at a million of dollars. The fire started in the stable of John M. Smith, furniture manufacturer. Among the buildings destroyed is the Hay Market Theatre.

Agrarian Troubles in Ireland Settled. DUBLIN, April 13. The plan of campaign has collapsed on the Townhill estate, Limerick, and also on the Glensharold estate, the tenants of the former purchasing their holdings under the Ashbourne Act, and those of the latter who were evicted being reinstated on payment of a single year's rent—less than 30 per cent. So the seven year's struggle is ended.

Nova Scotia News. HALIFAX, April 13. The Portland Packing Co.'s buildings at Chester were destroyed by fire last night. The mail steamer Oregon arrived here on Sunday night with 450 passengers. The fifteen-year-old son of Phillip Riddell, printer in the Herald office, shot himself dead yesterday morning while playing with a loaded revolver.

Labor Troubles. SAN FRANCISCO, April 13. One thousand shoemakers were thrown out of employment here on Saturday by reason of the Shoemakers Association declaring a lock-out, in consequence of the men protesting against the introduction of the locking machine.

Legislative Council Abolition. FREDERICTON, April 13. The bill abolishing the Legislative Council of New Brunswick passed that body on Saturday by a vote of 10 to 8. It is said that the opponents of the bill will obstruct it on its third reading.
