THE body of Howard Farrow, the victim of the recent yachting disaster on Misouche Shoals, was found near the scene of the accident about four o'clock yesterday afternoon. An inquest was held before Coroner Jarvis and a verdict of "accidental drowning" returned. The funeral took place this afternoon and was largely attended.

THE bark Ralph E. Peake, Capt. McDougall, in ballast from Pernambuco, went ashore on Governor's Island at three o'clock this morning. The tug Frank C. Batt, with a crew of ten men, went to her assistance as soon as possible and the Heather Belle was also despatched to the scene this afternoon. It is expected that she will float at high water.

A BOAT race was held on Georgetown harbor on Thursday last. In the first race a dispute arose, owing to the manner in which some of the competitors turned the buoy, and the prize was awarded Mr. D. McCormack, of Boughton Island. In the second race Mr. H. Graham, of Murray Harbor North, won first money, and Mr. McPhee, of DeGros Marsh, second.

THE British Admiralty is about to try petroleum as a motive power on one of its cruisers, and the experiment, if successful, may lead to many radical changes, especially at such stations as are in the Indian Ocean, where coal has to be obtained from England or New South Wales. For many years the refuse left from petroleum after the volatile oils had been distilled has been in successful use on steamers in the Caspian sea.

THE United States has periodical financial squalls of a serious nature, and the periods are becoming shorter. The people blame the Government, but the New York Times thinks that so long as the country requires the Government to maintain at par legal tender notes which it cannot pay and retire, and to coin every year some thirty odd millions of dollars, worth intrinsically only twenty-four millions, the Government is to be pitied and not blamed for its inevitable failure to succeed in an impossible task.

WE regret to learn that about two o'clock this afternoon a young man named Amos Adams, employed in the Railway Carpenter Shop, had all the fingers of his left hand cut off at the last joint. Adams was one of three men employed about a planer in the shop. While in the act of tightening a screw in the machine his hand came in contact with the knife which was revolving with lightning-like rapidity, and almost before he was aware of the fact the four fingers, much mangled, were sent round the cylinder and thrown to the end of the planer, a distance of about six feet. Medical aid was quickly summoned and the unfortunate young man was removed to the City Hospital.

SPEAKING of the Nick Roberts-Gardner Circus, which gives two performances in this city next week, the Brooklyn, N. Y. Union says: The tent was very well filled, and the performance as usual, passed off without the slightest hitch. The novelties captured the audience in the most complete manner. Mr. Geo. D. Of Interest to Baptists.

St. John, N. B., Aug. 21.

At a meeting of the Board of Governors Professor Tufts, Principal of the Baptist Academy, presented the financial report of the Academy and Seminary. The cash receipts for the past year were \$20,151, showing a profit of \$891. The report of the Treasurer of the College was also read and considered. The endowment fund now amounts to \$9,486, and the income from other sources was \$3,389. Miss Wadsworth was appointed Principal of the Ladies Seminary in the stead of Miss Graves, resigned. St. Martin's, N. B., was chosen as the location of the new Union Baptist Seminary.

The people of St. Martin's left no stone unturned to secure the location of the Seminary in that charming place. On the 13th inst., a public meeting was held in the Baptist Church, Mr. David Vaughan in the chair, when, after a spirited discussion, a committee was appointed to canvass the community in order to raise ten thousand dollars, "the sum required as an inducement to bring the institution to St. Martin's." The subscription list was at once headed by Captain Masters, who placed two thousand dollars after his name, followed by Mr. David Vaughan with one thousand dollars. The committee entered upon their work with vigor, and at an adjourned citizens' meeting, held last Wednesday night in the vestry of the church, Captain George Masters pledged himself for the magnificent sum of ten thousand dollars. Smaller sums to the amount of five thousand dollars in the aggregate were subscribed, raising the total to fifteen thousand dollars, every cent of which will be forthcoming.

The annual meeting of the Baptist Publication Society was held and a report of the year's work read, showing that during the past eighteen months their paper had earned over \$3,000 more than the cost of publishing. The circulation is now 6,000. The Governors have decided to erect a new academy boarding-house to accommodate forty-four persons.

A Confirmed Bigamist.

Montreal, Aug. 21.

J. D. Bennett, of Halifax, N. S., who has been arrested here for bigamy committed three years ago, has already served a term in Dorchester penitentiary for the same thing. His wife did not have any information until now because he had threatened to kill her. Bennett's right name is thought to be Griffiths.

Bad Weather for Marksmen.

The Provincial Rifle Association of Nova Scotia will finish firing their prize competitions to-day. Capt. Bishop, of the 63rd Batt. is the leading man so far. The average of the shooting is low on account of the unusually bad weather.

Down on a Coal Mine.

Cow Bay, C. B., Aug. 21.

The Blockhouse mine and Coal Co's mine, which was seized by the Government for arrears of royalties amounting to \$12,000, was sold yesterday by sheriff's sale for the sum of \$7,000.

A Tea-Ship Founders.

London, Aug. 21.

The steamer Aberdeen, Harkow, from China for London with a cargo of 5,500 tons of tea, foundered shortly after leaving the China Sea. The fate of the crew is so far unknown.
