Automobile Is Boosting Que. Industrial Surge

MONTREAL (CP)—The automobile is helping to accelerate Quebec along the road to becoming an industrial giant.
Since the start of construction of two auto assembly plants near Montreal, Premier Lesage's promise of resulting "profound repercussions on Quebec's economic growth" is showing signs of fulfillment.
Three rubber companies are readying plants for production early in 1966 of passenger car tires never before manufactured in the once traditionally agricultural province. Housing starts in the affected towns are reported far ahead of previous figures.
The wheels of progress began to turn with the announcement General Motors of Canada Ltd. would build a plant costing up to \$75,000,000 in Ste. Therese, Que., 20 miles northwest of Montreal to produce 100,000 autos annually.
This news was followed by an arrangement to assemble Renault and Peugeot cars from France at a \$3,500,000 plant at St-Bruno, Que., 15 miles southeast of Montreal.
WILL EMPLOY 1,250
The two plants will employ a total of 1,250 persons when they open late in 1965 and may eventually expand to provide 3,000 jobs.
Many of these assembly-line jobs, as well as some positions in the three tire factories, are open to unskilled workers, a category of workman Quebec has found particular difficulty in employing.

SEEDING SLOW ON PRAIRIES

OTTAWA (CP)—Little seeding has been done in the Prairie grain belt so far because of a heavy winter snowfall and late springing thaw, the bureau of statistics has reported. The moisture picture is bright.
In its first telegraphic crop report of 1965, the bureau said recent warm weather is drying the land and good weather will make seeding general on the Prairies.
The up-to-date report was compiled from dispatches by government agriculture correspondents and private crop observers and grain officials.
In the Maritimes, pastures and hay fields survived the winter in good condition. Cool, dry weather has been drying the land quickly and potatoes are being seeded in advanced areas.
Vegetable seeding will be general this week in Nova Scotia. Some grain has been sown in New Brunswick.
In Prince Edward Island, no grain has been seeded so far but some potatoes and turnips have been planted in light soil areas recently. Low temperatures and lack of rain have retarded grass growth.
In the Quebec City area, poor quality hay has forced dairy farmers to purchase extra mill feeds, increasing production costs of milk.

DESIGN NEW REACTOR

DEEP RIVER, Ont. (CP)—Atomic Energy of Canada Limited is establishing a new engineering design group associated with its power projects establishment in Toronto. President J. L. Gray said Wednesday. The group will work on design of an advanced type of nuclear power reactor expected to produce cheap electrical power than present reactors now in operation.

Not considered lightly by provincial officials are verbal agreements from General Motors and the French companies to buy accessories and parts in Quebec wherever possible.
The General Investment Corporation, a Quebec body pooling private and public capital, said considerable expansion of existing Quebec auto parts and materials firms is expected to result from the Renault-Peugeot decision to locate here.
Mr. Lesage also indicated the two assembly plants will become important customers for the Sidbec steel project soon to be constructed at Beranec near Trois-Rivieres.
Speculation that Ford Motor Company of Canada Ltd and Chrysler Canada Ltd will locate new plants in Quebec has not materialized.
