Hughes didn't have too much pressure on him as his teammates gave him a six run cushion ever before he tossed a ball. He coasted to his first series win. Juniors must be considered favourites to win this best-of-five semi-final round with the Shamrocks. They figured they've taken the Irish down to earth—let them know that for them (the Shamrocks) it's going to be a mighty tough road the rest of the distance. Lions didn't give Art anything to work on and his well-pitched game just went down a line.

Such happenings don't exactly make the Lions a very social gang as they took the field for the Saturday game. If ever they meant business it was then. Everyone could sense it. Aces and fans alike.

Even with Saturday's victory all wrapped up and the series on a 1-1 basis, Lions aren't doing too much grinning. They're bitter about that win that was taken away from them and they vow that Aces will pay for it dearly.

The latest offer for the Tribe—reported in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000—came after Daley hinted the Indians might move on to greener pastures.

Commented Daley Friday after news of the latest proposal leaked out: "I wouldn't consider the sale of the club at any price or in any circumstances. Ellis Hits Golf Jackpot; Captures Canadian Open

EDMONTON (CP)—Slender Wee Ellis, who plays golf "to make a little money," hit the jackpot Saturday with his first major tournament victory on a pressure-packed 13-under-par 267 in the \$25,000 Canadian open.

He did it by out-dueling a flock of tournament-tough pros who ripped the par-70 Mayfair course to shreds.

The 26-year-old six-footer from Ridgewood, N.J., overcame an early case of jitters to blitz a four-under-par 66 in the first round and pass veteran Jay Hebert in a tense battle down to the last hole. It earned him \$3,500 and the Seagram gold cup.

Hebert started the last 18 holes with a two-stroke bulge over: Ellis and two others and shot a steady 69 for a 268 total to take second-place money of \$2,300. The 35-year-old Frenchman from Sanford, Fla., watched a desperate 45-foot last-hole putt stop 18 inches short of the cup and cancel out his chance of a tie with Ellis.

Summerside Juniors Grab First Victory In Series

Summerside's MacLellan Pontiacs, trailing 2-0 in their best-of-seven series with Charlottetown's Legionaires' Juniors, fought back gamely at Memorial Field to squeak out a 7-6 verdict and garner their first series victory.

The Pontiacs were never behind in yesterday's battle but they surely must have sighed a big sigh of relief when the final out was made.

Legionaires trailed 7-4 entering the last of the ninth. They got two runs home, and runners on second and third when pitcher John Bethel threw Donnie LeClair out at first.

It was a tough ball game for the Legionaires to drop but they had nobody to blame but themselves. Pitcher Roger MacLeod, who took the loss, hurled a nine hitter and it was good enough to give him a triumph if eight damaging errors had not been committed behind him.

Bethel in victory gave up a total of ten base blows but his mates although making four miscues behind him, came up with some really snappy plays. Lorne DesRoches robbed Jack Kane of at least a double when he raced to the fence to grab the long fly. A snappy double play in the very first inning pulled Bethel out of a heap of trouble. Grant Grady started the twin killing throwing to Greg Deighan at second to nail Wayne MacDonald and Deighan got his loss off to Boates at first and Roger Gallant was a dead duck.

Two singles and two errors paved the way for the first tallies by the winners in the first. Three

They were one shot behind George Bayer of Lemont, Ill., 1957 champion who shot 65 following a six-under-par 64 Friday.
