

St. Mary's Score 3-1 Victory Over Moncton

HALIFAX, Nov. 26 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's outplayed and outskated Moncton Hawks in all three periods Saturday night to defeat the Maritime Senior Hockey League cellar dwellers 3-1.

Skating fast both ways from the opening whistle, the Saints swarmed all over the Hawks but inaccurately shooting on most of their best chances and a strong performance by Moncton goalie Les Colvin kept the score down. The Halifax club shot their first goal before a minute had elapsed and added a second in the first period while holding the Hawks scoreless. Moncton registered their lone tally in the middle stanza with the Saints applying the clincher late in the final chapter.

Best performer on the Halifax lineup was winger Danny Wilkes who fired two goals and played a strong two-way game. A close second for star rating was defenseman Eddie Brown, back in form after a pair of bad games.

The Saints outshot Moncton almost two to one and sifted through a weak defence as they pleased but Colvin, after a shaky start, turned in one of his best games of the season.

Hawks best period was the second when they fired 10 shots at D'Aoust. In the other two frames, the combination of a tight defence and back skating front liners left D'Aoust with little to do.

In a fast first frame that saw Saints outplay Hawks by a big margin, the local club shot two goals. Danny Wilkes fired the first, a whistling drive into the left corner after picking up Jack Hollett's pass from the opposite wing. Five minutes later, with the Saints ganging the Moncton end while Jean Paul Jeanneau was serving a charging penalty, Gordon Miller poked Bob Eguer's rebound home with Colvin living outside the crease. Frank Grabowski also drew an assist on the goal.

Early in the second period, Delmonte was chased for elbowing and the Saints went goal hunting again. A pressure play backfired when Barkwell picked up a loose puck and skated in on D'Aoust unmolested for the only Moncton goal.

The Saints took control of the play again in the third, and only a stout defence thrown up by Colvin prevented several more goals. Wilkes converted Watson's pass with a bullet drive from the wing six minutes before the game ended to complete the scoring.

Glace Bay Legionaires Win McCurdy Cup

GLACE BAY, N. S., Nov. 26 — (CP) — The McCurdy Cup, emblematic of Maritime English rugby supremacy, returned to Cape Breton for the first time since 1946 Saturday when Glace Bay Legionaires came from behind to defeat Acadia University Axemen 13-8 in a sudden-death game.

The collegians, who won the cup last year, kept play in the narrow end of the field during the first half, when they led 6-0, as Neil McVicar booted three penalty goals.

Labelled "has-beens" and "tired old men", Legionaires 13, many of them veterans of famed Caledonia teams, forced the play in the second half. Veteran Jimmy O'Dell, a former Caledonia three quarter, twisted and weaved 75 yards to ground the ball for the game-winning try.

O'Dell intercepted a pass by McVicar, Acadia stand-off, on Glace Bay's 25-yard line and slid over the goal line with two tacks hanging onto his shoestrings. The convert was good. Then big Dan Joe Currie picked up an Axemen's fumble on Acadia's 35-yard line a minute later and scored another Glace Bay try. Bugs Gallant got a try for Legionaires when he fell on a loose ball following a five-yard scam.

Veteran O'Dell added to the "tired old men's" triumph when he booted a 25-yard penalty goal later in the game. Acadia picked up two points in the second half on a penalty goal by McVicar.

Q.A.H.A. To Study C.A.H.A. Decision

MONTREAL, Nov. 26 — (CP) — The Quebec Amateur Hockey Association Saturday voted to form a special committee to study a Canadian Amateur Hockey Association decision to allow two Quebec players to remain with Saskatchewan Quakers of the Western Canada Senior League.

Defencemen Larry Zeidel formerly of Quebec Aces and Bill Heindl of Sherbrooke Saints were not released by their Quebec senior loop teams nor given transfers by the Q.A.H.A. to the Western League.

The C.A.H.A. first suspended the two following a Q.S.H.L. protest. However, in a mail vote last week, branch presidents of the C.A.H.A. and other officers agreed to permit Heindl and Zeidel to remain with Saskatoon. Q.A.H.A. officials had threatened to quit the Canadian body when the case first came up more than a month ago, but such action was brushed aside at Saturday's meeting.

The special committee will be appointed by Q.A.H.A. president Wilfred Duranceau and will report to the next meeting in a month.

Canadiens Defeat Boston Bruins 3-1

BOSTON, Nov. 26 — (CP) — Montreal Canadiens, delayed seven hours in reaching Boston because of bad weather conditions in the Eastern United States and Canada, came from behind tonight to whip Boston Bruins 3-1 before a crowd of 8,239.

Opening of the game was delayed 90 minutes to allow the Habitués to dress after travelling from Toronto, where they lost to the Maple Leafs Saturday night. All New England transportation was severely affected by Saturday's near-hurricane followed by freezing temperatures.

Leo Lamoureux and his Islanders continued to keep well at the top of the Big Four Hockey League standing over the week-end with a win and a loss. Shading the cellar-dwelling Moncton Hawks on their home ice on Friday night, the Islanders concluded their week's schedule at Saint John where they lost a free-scoring battle to the Beavers by a 7-6 margin Saturday night.

Holding a 13-point margin over their nearest rivals, Halifax Saint Mary's, as the result of their Friday night win over Moncton, Islanders' loss and Saintamarians win on Saturday cut down their stranglehold on the league leadership a little. It still leaves Islanders, however, with a tidy margin of 11 points to come and go before Saint Mary's can think of even disputing that leadership.

Beavers' victory over Islanders Saturday still keeps them in a close race with Halifax for the number two spot in the league standing, with striking distance of that position by three points — the same as they were before the final week-end games. As has been the case throughout most of the schedule so far, it was the lowly Moncton Hawks who bore the brunt in defeats. Four consecutive losses of them over the week-end, still leaves them in the cellar with only 15 points, seven behind Beavers, ten behind Halifax and twenty-one behind the leading Island pucksters.

Two of the league's leading goalies, Hal Gordon of Islanders and Dennis Brodeur of Beavers, didn't do their goaltending averages any good in their Saturday night performances to let a total of 13 get passed them, equal to the most goals scored in any one game this season. The only game to match that record this year was Islanders 11-2 victory over Moncton on October 30th, and Halifax St. Mary's 8-5 win over Moncton on October 19th.

It is an ill wind that blows nobody good, however — and Islanders and Beavers' players had a field day on padding their scoring statistics. Islanders red-thatched speedy right winger Bruno Favaro had himself a big night for sniping honors, banging home three goals and collecting an equal number of assists for the large total of six points. Although the official ratings were not on hand at time of writing, Favaro's goal-getting spree should put him to the top of the scoring race. Up to and including last Monday night's games, Favaro and Bill Watson of Halifax were tied for top honors. Since that time Favaro has picked up six points and Watson four, which should give the Islanders' marksman a two-point edge over the Haligonian sharpshooter with totals of 38-36.

Island sporting fans will be pleased to learn that they will have a chance to see the Islanders in action against Sydney Millionaires here early next month. Islanders' lead over Halifax St. Mary's was reduced to 11 points with Saint John remaining three points below Halifax.

Charlottetown opened the scoring but Beavers stayed out front the rest of the way as the visitors shot a brace in each period while Saint John fired three in the first, three in the second and the winner in the third.

Beavers skated and passed with the league leaders on equal terms, also matching roughness when it occurred. The Islanders showed defensive weakness in their own zone.

A new Saint John line, with Tommy Brennan at centre for Jack Thaler and Paul Platz, tallied four times. Thaler, of Glace Bay Miners last season, received Maritime Amateur Hockey Association permission to play with Beavers because of injuries among the locals.

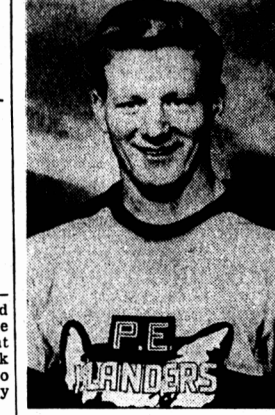
