No Blame Found In Highway Death

GEORGETOWN — A coroner's jury attached no blame to Barry Roland MacLeod of Murray Harbor North in the death of William Henry Gillis of Point Pleasant, following a highway accident near Montague Oct. 16. Gillis died enroute to the Kings County Memorial Hospital, the verdict said, as a result of injuries received in the accident. The coroner, Dr. L.E. Prowse of Montague, presided over the inquest and he read the autopsy report of Dr. John Craig. Witnesses giving evidence were: Sgt. Reginald B. Bates of Montague RCMP detachment. Mr. M.C. Bonnell of Murray Harbor North; Lester Brehaut of Point Pleasant; Barry Roland MacLeod of Murray Harbor North and Douglas Cotin of Montague. Consultant Firm To Be Engaged To Survey Water Sewage Needs

GEORGETOWN — Canadian British Engineering Consultants will be engaged by the Town of Georgetown to assess requirements for water supply, water distribution and sewage in relation to the town's anticipated growth and future industry. Illegal Liquor Selling Case Is Adjourned

Alfred MacLeod of Charlottetown, charged with illegally selling liquor, was held in custody at the police station, following a hearing in court yesterday. The case was adjourned to Nov. 17 by Magistrate J.A. Haslam, General Sessions, in his return to Ottawa this week. Charged with false pretences, John C. MacLeod of Belle River was remanded until Nov. 17. Albert Woods of Fredericton was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving a truck with four adults in the cab. One person was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor. Three persons were fined with being drunk and incapable were each fined \$20 and costs or 20 days, and three was given a 30-day suspended sentence.

Mr. Smallwood was addressing a conference on electric heating sponsored by the Newfoundland Light and Power Company Limited.
