A SUCCESSFUL STUDENT.—We hear with pleasure that Mr. E. Percy Moore, son of Mr. Theophilus Moore, of the Inland Revenue department, has just passed a most successful examination at the University of Pennsylvania, and has been awarded the degree of M. D. Mr. Moore was a student in the office of Dr. Kelly. We have not heard where he intends practicing.

CIVIC.—The regular monthly meeting of the City Council, to have been held yesterday afternoon, stands adjourned until this afternoon for the want of a quorum. Those present yesterday afternoon were Mayor Hill and Councilors Crabbe, Hogan, McKay and Beer. The other four councilors state through the Patriot that they will not attend meetings in the afternoon, but are willing to attend meetings held in the evenings.

THE BUCTOUCHE RAILWAY.—Now life appears to have been infused into the Buctouche and Moncton railway. A working train is now engaged in blasting and putting in a new siding at Moncton, but shippers still complain of the scarcity of cars. A great quantity of logs, railway ties and other wood stuff has been got out at different points along, and this, together with stone from the quarries along the line, guarantees a large summer's business.

THE HALIFAX POLICE POSITION.—The new chief receives \$1,000 a year to start with, and \$100 increase for each of three years. The present city marshal retains that title, and attends to the city civil court business at \$300 a year. The police committee is displeased with the new act. Commission to manage the force is now composed of the mayor, chief of police and Ald. Outhit. They appoint, regulate, reprimand or dismiss. If one of them dissents from the other two, he can, if he likes, appeal to the council. The new chief of police has to give securities in \$2,000 for performance of duty.

EGG CASE PATENTS.—We are informed by Messrs. J. A. Ritchie and Cephas Murley that their application for a patent on egg case fasteners has been granted. This patent embraces two methods, one being a screw attachment which, while being convenient and easily operated, makes the package secure against pilfering in transit; the other is a spring hinge with press button for cheap cases and boxes. These cases are now being supplied to the trade by Messrs. J. A. Farquharson & Co.

WERE THEY ROBBED?—There arrived at the I. C. R. station last night a man named Gallant, his wife, and his wife's father. The trio were from Yarmouth by this morning's boat. Somewhere between the Island and this city Gallant lost his pocket book containing ten dollars. After a thorough search through the pockets of the three enough money was found to send the senior ahead where money will be secured to send here for the strapped pair, who are now at the house of one of the railroad men.—St. John Gazette.

Committed for Trial.

(Toronto Empire, May 4)
 Alfred J. Parker, proprietor of the Canadian Queen, was at the Police Court yesterday to answer to a charge of fraud. Amos Parker, of Chatham, is the complainant in the case. He noticed the advertisement offering prizes for readers who would furnish the six letters designated by stars, thus:
 T * * * * *
 Mr. Parker sent in his guess, giving "Toronto" as a solution. Four days after he received a card informing him that he would receive a special reward providing he secured three subscriptions to The Queen, at \$1 each, and sent 75 cents for express charges. He fulfilled all the conditions but the prize was not forthcoming, neither did the subscribers receive a paper. He accordingly informed the police. Miss McCarty, who up to the first week in January, was cashier for The Queen, said that no matter whether the solution received was correct or not a letter was sent to each person sending in an answer informing them that their guess was correct and that they would receive a prize if they complied with the conditions. Up to the first of March James Brennan was the manager of the subscription department of The Queen Publishing Company. He said that since the first of November no prizes had been sent, though a number of subscriptions had been received, and also many complaints. He had informed Mr. Parker of these complaints, but had been told to ignore them. Magistrate Denison thought there was sufficient evidence and committed Parker for trial.

News Notes.

QUEBEC, May 7.—The steamer Labrador, which arrived yesterday, landed 826 steerage passengers. The steamers Laurentian, of the Allan line, and Shubertuk (German) are reported below with 1080 and 700, respectively, and all well.

A letter from one of the leaders of the revolutionary movement in Cuba states that arrangements are complete for a great uprising of Cubans against Spanish rule in June. Most of the 500,000 Cubans in the United States have enlisted in the movement to free their native land.

A despatch from Calcutta to the London Daily Chronicle says that the Indian Government has decided to depose the Khan of Khetal on account of his irreligious bloodthirstiness. While the torture to which he subjected his wives and ministers recently has been under investigation, he has murdered 65 of his subjects, thus raising the number of murders committed at his instance since he began to reign in 1857 to 3,000. He has killed five of his wives; one of them he burned alive. The Indian Government appoints the Khan's son to be nominal ruler; so as to conciliate the native chiefs, and annexes Beluchistan.
