Freedomites Must Decide

VICTORIA (CP)—The Sons of Freedom Doukhobors will not be granted an extension of their back-to-Russia "sign up" deadline unless they are officially accepted as migrants by the Soviet Union.

Attorney-General Robert Bonner made the statement Thursday. He had a 1½-hour conference here Wednesday with a delegation representing the Freedomites.

"There is no question of an extension at this time," Mr. Bonner said.

Mayor Gilroy Declares There Will Always Be A Springhill

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP)—The resolute mayor of this hard-luck coal mining town, faced with its third disaster in less than two years, vowed Friday: "There will always be a Springhill."

Ralph G. Gilroy, 49-year-old security officer at Cumberland Railway and Coal Company here, said his town of 7,000 hardy mining folk will fight back.

"Miners of Springhill are a very peculiar breed," he said. "There's no better breed anywhere."

He said the town struggled back after a mine explosion in 1956 claimed 39 of its men. A fire that burned out a large section of the town's business section last year "didn't stop us."

Toronto University Head Pledges Academic Loyalty

TORONTO (CP)—Dr. Claude T. Bissell pledged loyalty to academic tradition Friday night as he was installed as president of the University of Toronto.

"Unless the inter-relationship between past and present is maintained, the university may find itself wandering in areas where it is confused and ineffective," he said.

Universities were being subject to unusually great pressures from society—not only because of a rising population, but because of demands for better education and higher numbers of professional, creative intellectuals.

ANGERS IN SIGHT

"There are dangers in this new popularity," Mr. Bissell said. "The sudden discovery that universities are primary producers of valuable goods has brought in a whole host of self-styled experts on production and marketing. We could easily find ourselves persuaded into techniques of mass production of a stereotyped article."

The University of Toronto would cling to academic freedom, independence, its system of religious colleges, its concern for the individual student and its emphasis on specialized honors courses.

Lord Montgomery Sees US Much To Blame For Muddle

LONDON (Reuters) — Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery said today that the United States must shoulder "a large proportion, perhaps most, of the blame" for the present world situation.

The 71-year-old military hero ripped into U.S. foreign policy—and that of Britain under its former Labor government—in a lecture at the Royal United Services institution here.

In a reference to the Anglo-French Suez intervention of 1956, Montgomery declared: "If the United States had not sabotaged the Suez operation and had joined the Baghdad Pact earlier, the situation in the Middle East would have been very different."

(The U.S. is not a full member of the pact, although it belongs to all its main committees.)

INCONSISTENT POLICY

Montgomery, who retired a month ago from the British Army and as deputy supreme allied commander in Europe, asserted American foreign policy was inconsistent.

Washington seemed to have one policy in the United Nations and another when its own national interests were involved.
