WASHINGTON (CP) - The U.S. civil aeronautics board said that the crash of a Canadian Pacific Airlines plane in Honolulu last year killing 27 persons was probably caused when an attempt was made to break off landing and the plane was flying too low and too slow.

The plane, a Bristol Britannia turbine-jet with 40 persons aboard crashed near the runway at Honolulu International Airport on July 27, 1962. Most of the dead were Australians and New Zealanders. The Canadian dead included the pilot, Capt. Weland T. Jones, 45, of Vancouver.

the aircraft was in a full-landing configuration, at insufficient air speed and altitude to maintain control. The board is unable to determine the reason why a co-around would have been attempted at so late a stage in the approach and with the aircraft still in the full landing configuration. There was no evidence to indicate a go-around was required in order to avoid any of the obstacles, vehicles or pedestrians which 'ave been on the runway.'

The Prince Edward Island Potato Industry might not suffer directly from loss of the Cuban market, but could do so indirectly as the view of Agriculture Minister Andrew MacIntyre on an Ottawa report that forecasts by Canadian authorities to cut production of the Cuban government's intentions for orders for seed potatoes had been unsuccessful thus far.

Last year, the report noted, more than \$400,000 worth of New Brunswick seeds were sold to the Caribbean island. In 1960, sales amounted to nearly \$1,000,000.

This year there have been rumors that Dutch interests are trying to work their way into the Cuban market, possibly with the aid of the U.S. government.

Mr. MacRae recalled that, in the past, island interests have sold to Cuba, though not in any great quantity. But he believes some exporters from other areas have occasionally used island potatoes to complete orders.

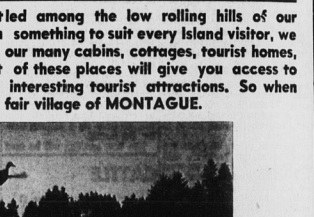
