P.E.I. Fisheries Federation Quarterly Meeting Held

A motion that members of the P.E.I. Fisheries Department should be on the commission to be set up to work out the details for assistance to fishermen was passed unanimously at the quarterly meeting of the Federation held at Murray Harbor yesterday afternoon. The meeting was presided over by the president, Mr. L. W. Noonan, Charlottetown. The minutes and correspondence were read by the secretary, Mr. A. Walthen Gaudet also of Charlottetown.

During the ensuing discussion on the fishermen assistance question, many speakers presented their views. Mr. Eugene Gorman of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources stated that the actual present loss would run from \$10,000 to \$15,000 in traps and equipment together with a subsequent further loss in unusable traps next year. He said his department had conducted a survey following the storm, and it was estimated that actual damage amounted to about 65% with a further 20% loss in traps not fit to repair for next year.

It was pointed out that the Federal Government would advance 75% of a long term loan to the fishermen, and the Provincial Government would advance the other 25%. It was further said that a representative from Ottawa would meet with Provincial Government representatives to work out the details of the proposed assistance plan.

The second question of the agenda was that of outside buyers purchasing the lobsters from the fishermen. Although methods were proposed to deal with this question, none seemed to provide a solution. It was finally proposed to call a joint meeting of the Federation and the Fishermen's Association in Charlottetown in July to attempt to arrive at some solution to the grave question.

The matter of a ten-day extension to the present season was brought up, but as it was considered a matter for the Fishermen's Association it was left in their hands, only that the Federation offered to lend its support in any approaches which the Association might deem advisable to take.

At the conclusion of the meeting, those present enjoyed a very delicious supper at the Prowse Hotel.
