

White Sox Gain As Yanks Lose; Braves Win Again

A two-run single by Red Schoendienst in the eighth inning carried Milwaukee's National League leading straggle to a 3-3 victory over Cincinnati Thursday, their 11th success in 13 games with the Redlegs this season.

The victory padded Milwaukee's lead to two games, pending a night game between second-place St. Louis and Chicago. Third-place Brooklyn also had a night game, with the New York Giants.

Philadelphia defeated Pittsburgh 6-3 for a fourth-place tie with Cincinnati, seven games behind.

In the American League, Washington Senators stunned first-place New York for the second day in a row, whipping the Yankees 6-3. The Senators led five games against Chicago's second-place White Sox beat Kansas City 7-4.

Baltimore tripped Boston 3-1 and Cleveland defeated Detroit 3-1.

Schoendienst's clincher came after the Braves had loaded the bases without a hit against losing reliever Raul Sanchez. Lew Burdette won it for a 10-7 record, gaining his 10th victory in the last 11 decisions, trimming their lead to five games against Chicago's second-place White Sox.

Philadelphia's victory over Pittsburgh was the eighth in a row, with the Redlegs leading by a 3-1 margin when George Crowe and Frank Robinson slugged successive 400-foot home runs in the top of the eighth.
