McLure Scores Delay In Starting Ch'town Project

OTTAWA, June 16—(Special)—Public works for Prince Edward Island occupied the centre of the House of Commons stage for a time today when members for both King's and Queen's speed Works Minister Fournier to urge essential public facilities at Charlottetown and Souris.

Air Conditioning "Rotten" In House Says Mr. McLure

OTTAWA, June 16—(CP)—W. Chester S. McLure (PC—Queens) said today in the Commons that one "might just as well die from bad air as go out with the virus of a cold."

High Valuation

"Yes, the Exchequer Court and they are having a real checker play there," rejoined Mr. McLure.
