

Declares Hatchery Trout Are Only Waste Of Time

EDMONTON (CP) — Hatchery trout are unable to compete successfully for food with native fish and it is a waste of time to stock most streams, says a zoologist. Dr. R. B. Miller of the University of Alberta said here that although the principle of stocking streams has been held valid for almost 100 years, recent research has shown that less than one per cent of the trout try turned loose one season are still alive the following year.

Even if fish are not placed in streams until they are seven or eight inches long, he said, only three per cent remain after one year.

In the third year, he said, some of the planted fish have reached weights up to 10 pounds, and younger fish are unable to compete. The answer to the problem is to poison all fish periodically and restock the body of water with "fry."

The zoologist said the practice of protecting fish during the spawning season is also open to question.

Trout are not easily caught in spawning seasons because they are not then interested in eating, he said, and a female fish caught in open season means the loss of as many eggs as though it were caught in the closed season in September.

22,000 Ontario Workers On Strike; More Threaten

TORONTO (CP)—More workers are involved now in labor disputes in Ontario than at any other time this year. About 22,000 workers are currently on strike, and another 20,000 are threatening to take strike action to enforce their demands for wage and benefit increases.

The powerful United Automobile Workers union (UAW-CIO) is the major union involved in the disputes, with 25,000 members either on strike or ready to walk out.

At the five Ontario plants of the General Motors Corporation of Canada, 17,000 workers have been on strike since Sept. 19 to back demands for higher wages and other benefits. Plants involved are at Oshawa, St. Catharines, Toronto, London and Windsor.

The UAW also called a strike of 1,900 workers at the de Havilland Aircraft Co. to try to win a 10-cent hourly wage increase retroactive to Sept. 1, 1954. This strike started July 11, and forced the closing of the company's offices, affecting another 1,300 employees.

Three Massey-Harris-Ferguson plants, employing 4,800 workers at Toronto, Brantford and Woodstock, are preparing to take a strike vote. The union there is seeking a guaranteed annual wage, 10-cent-an-hour pay increase and higher pensions.

Thirteen hundred members of the United Electrical Workers (Ind.) walked out Sept. 20 at the Canada Wire and Cable Company plant in the Toronto suburb of Leaside. The union sought a 12-cent increase in the hourly pay.

WITHDRAWAL STARTS

CAIRO (AP) — British troops began withdrawing from the Sudan Tuesday when units of the Royal Leicestershire Regiment left Khartoum by train for Port Sudan where they will embark for Cyprus. Departure of the regiments 1st Battalion coincides with simultaneous withdrawal of Egyptian troops. The pullout marks another step in the British-Egyptian agreement to permit the Sudan to determine its future free of foreign pressures.

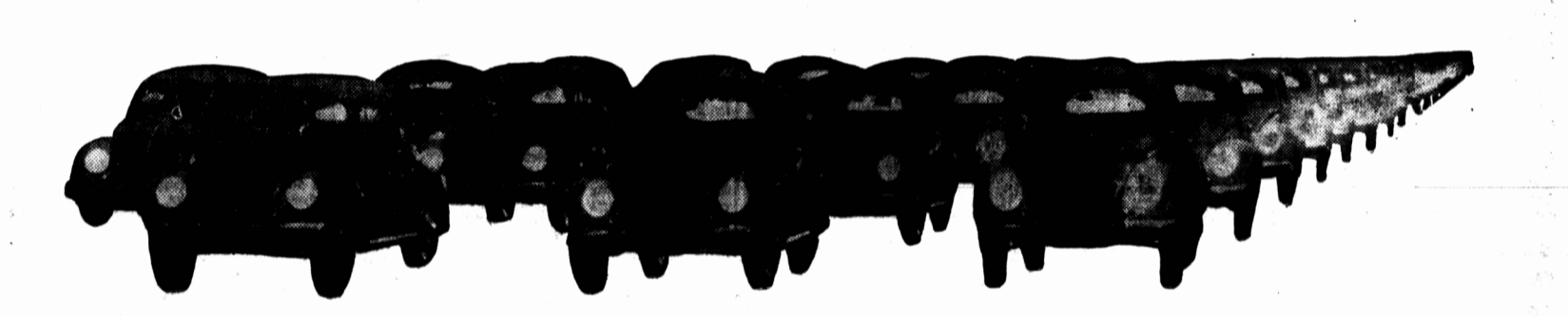

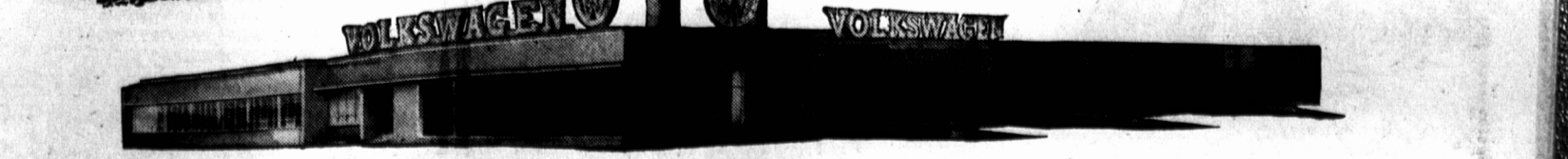
