LARGE HAWK SHOT DOWN

Two Georgetown men, Gerald Martell and Barry Boudreau, shot a very large Hawk recently in the Rosemeath area of the Brudenell River. The bird had a wing span of seven feet and its large hooked beak and long sharp claws gave it a somewhat fearsome appearance. Two other Hawks were sighted by the two Georgetown men. This area along the head waters of the Brudenell River seems to be a favourite spot for this type of bird. Several years ago two Georgetown men shot several of apparently the same species, and it was quite common to observe their large nests atop high trees. Barnyard fowl and small game animals would be easy prey of this type of Hawk, and its elimination may save the lives of a great number of wild and domestic creatures.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says with sunny skies and light winds, afternoon temperatures will rise to the 50s today.

A weak weather system approaching from the west will cross the district Sunday giving cloudy skies with temperatures a little warmer than on Saturday.

Regional forecasts: Northern Nova Scotia, Eastern Shore, Prince Edward Island: sunny and warmer; winds north-west 20 shifting in the evening to south-west 15; low-high at New Glasgow 33 - 55, Goshen 30 - 55, Charlottetown 33 - 55, outlook for Sunday: cloudy and a little warmer.

High Winds Cause Damage

SUMMERSIDE — High winds caused considerable damage in the Summerside area yesterday, particularly through Thursday night, when signs of at least three town business firms broke loose and were damaged or destroyed, and a large tree on Russell Street was blown down.

The meteorological section at CFB Summerside reported a peak gust of 71 miles per hour here at 5:30 Friday morning when winds were averaging 45 to 50. Skies cleared last evening and the wind eased greatly.

The town electric light department reported several minor power failures due to the high winds breaking wires.

Nancy George, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. R. George, North River Road, Charlottetown, who is a student at Prince of Wales College, will represent Red Cross Youth (one of four from across Canada) at a Centennial International Development Program Seminar at Camp Samac, Osh-

awa, Ontario from October 21st to 23rd.

In attendance at this seminar will be 30 young people from all provinces representing various organizations such as Boy Scouts, Red Cross, B'Nai B'rith, U.N. Association and YIMCA.

The purpose of the seminar is to bring together a group of gifted youth leaders in their own communities and organizations, as consultants to plan to help carry out an energetic centennial international program involving youth across Canada.

Learning about the needs of the emerging countries, studying the problems of developing suitable aid programs, and discussing methods for creating interest and raising money for a worthwhile Canadian birthday gift to the developing countries are among the aims of the seminar.

The result of this conference will be the development of a feasible plan of action to be used as a basis for a Centennial international development program for the youth of communities across the country.

National President Visits Here

Doug Ward, the national president of the Canadian Union of Students arrived in Charlottetown last night in conjunction with the fall congress of the Atlantic Sector of CUS being held at St. Dunstan's University.

Mr. Ward, head of the 160,000 member Union, faces the most difficult year in the history of the national Union, with many universities calling for withdrawal or immediate reform.

St. Dunstan's Students' Union is calling for referendum to decide the issue at the local University, and it's expected that Ward will participate.

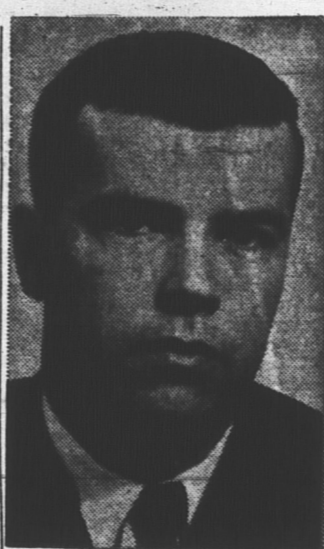
The funeral will take place from the MacLean Funeral Home this afternoon, a service commencing at two o'clock. Interment will be in Alexandra cemetery.
