

# Legion Hall Is Renovated

CARDIGAN — The main topic of the recent meeting of the Royal Canadian Legion, was the re-construction work on the hall which has been started under the winter works program. This work consisted of raising the present building and construction of a new steel reinforced cement basement. The basement is to include a men's lounge, mixed lounge, canteen and kitchen facilities, lavatories and a furnace room.

The architect for this project is Peter A. MacNeil of Charlottetown.

Work had commenced early in April, but had been held up because of the presence of frost under the building. It was decided to continue with the work, and Matt Redmond of Verona River has the contract for completion of the basement.

The Legion plans to re-open their Hall by June 1 for dances and other Legion activities.

# Montague Dump Problems Are Pondered By Council

The problem of the care and use of the present dump site and the location of a new one took up considerable time of the Montague Town Council meeting held last night with the deputy Mayor John Hughes presiding in the absence of Mayor B. H. Yen. Mayor Yen is still a patient in the Kings County Memorial Hospital where he underwent major surgery.

Councillors said residents of the town have been provided with a dump site for the past few years due to an extreme effort of the present and past councils. The biggest problem outside curtailing the cost of maintaining is to educate the public to use the dump in a proper manner. Many just drive through the gate and dump their garbage instead of driving their vehicles to the dumping area and dropping it over the curb or at least to the dumping area.

Several methods have been tried, none of them too successful, to get the public to do this. However, it always winds up the same way that the council has to hire machinery to do this job.

It now appears that due to the nearness of the frosted food plant and the hospital as well as residential areas, the building of a causeway to the frosted food plant dump will have to be located elsewhere.

**WISAGE PROBLEM**

Another headache of the council, especially the past few months, has been the closing of several lines. For the past month, Town Policeman Ed Downe has had crews of men working and trying to locate and fix the present lines. He advised the council last night that all lines are now fixed up but that manhole covers are built to facilitate the clearing of such lines.

Policeman Downe advised that the sand had been swept from the streets and it now appears that the material plugging the lines should never be put into a sewer line.

Councillor Reid in his report on street program advised that the streets had been swept from the streets and that the clearing of gutters and cutting of bushes especially on back streets would be carried out at once. **OTHER BUSINESS**

"If that pattern is to be positive and favourable one, it is going to be set by the 20 million of us cherish and pursue the same ideals that inspired our founding fathers," he said.

In reviewing the Charlottetown conference and the one held later in Quebec, Mr. Mulholland paid tribute to the courage, foresight and following delegates exhibited in paring the way for making Canada a nation.

In introducing the guest speaker, chairman R. G. Bowne said "tomorrow is a red-letter day for the Bank of Montreal in Charlottetown. Our Board of Directors will hold its first regular meeting here during the morning and the new premises for our branch will be officially opened during the afternoon."

Mr. Mulholland joined The Bank of Montreal at Peterborough, Ont., his home town, and served at Hamilton, Ont., London, England and Paris, France. He served in the Canadian Army in Canada and overseas for four years in January of this year he received his present appointment.
