

NEWS NOTES.

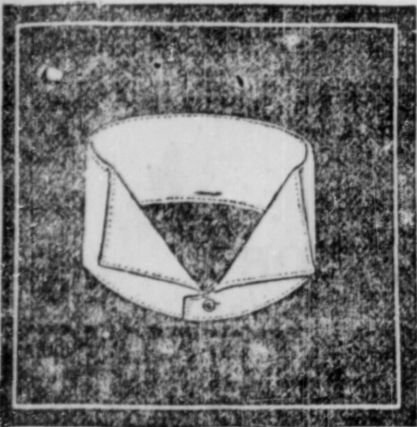
Robt Chapman, who was with the Foot Guards at Queen Victoria's marriage, and who served through the entire Crimean campaign, died at London a few days ago.

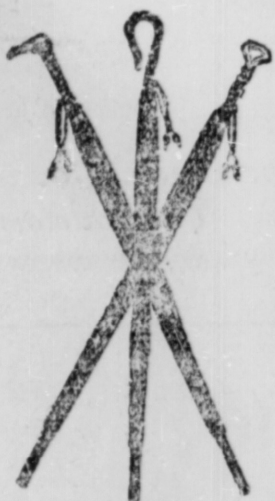

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

THURSDAY April 23.

House met at 5 p. m. Hon. Mr. Macdonald presented a bill incorporating the Farmers' Institute of Cherry Valley, which was referred to the Private Bills Committee.

Mr. Kichham asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to rebuild Souris West Government Wharf during this year.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the work was a most desirable one and he would use his influence with the Government to have it proceeded with. The cost would not be very great.

Mr. McWilliams asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition had been received from divers inhabitants of Lot 10 asking for the opening of a road from West Devon along the railroad to Mrs. Acorn's farm a distance of about 1/2 of a mile and thus enable owners of land to have access to it, and what action the Government intend to take regarding it.

Hon. Mr. McLean said such petition had been received and he would use his influence to have the prayer thereof complied with.

Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works to table a statement showing in detail how the item of \$1,250 as appears in the Public Accounts for 1897 and charged to boring for coal, is made up, the names of the persons employed, the number of days each person was so employed, the amount per day paid to each person respectively, and the report of the person in charge, and also the names of the settlement or locality, and the name of the owner or occupier of the farm or farms on which said boring was made.

Hon. Mr. McLean tabled the statement.

Mr. Shaw asked the C. P. Works to table a statement, showing in detail how the item of \$1883.24, as shown in the Public Accounts 1897 and charged to Roads Queen's Prince and King's Counties and Inquisitions on new roads is made up, the names of the persons to whom

payments were made, the amount paid to each person, the nature of the work done, and the name of the road or locality and County respectively in which said work was done.

Hon. Mr. McLean promised the information at the earliest opportunity. But his preparation would take some time. Mr. M. McKinnon asked the Leader of the Government to give a detailed statement of the sums of \$24 paid for a commission to Alexandria School District, \$10 for a commission to Alexandria School District, and \$15 paid for a commission to Glen William and Double District, the names of the persons to whom this money was paid, and the nature of the services rendered.

Hon. Mr. Warburton said the information would be tabled at the earliest opportunity.

Mr. M. McKinnon asked the Leader of the Government to give a statement of the work done in return for the several amounts charged to Boards of Health. The nature of the work done, the names of the persons attended, and the number of visits paid by each physician respectively.

Hon. Mr. Warburton also promised this information as soon as it could be made ready.

Hon. Mr. McLean tabled the original of Mr. Chappell's plan for the Prince of Wales College and a copy of Mr. Le May's plan. He said that no tenders for the erection of the building had been accepted and he did not deem it advisable to table those that had been received. The government were moving slowly in the matter because they were anxious to get the most up-to-date building at the smallest possible cost.

Mr. Shaw said they did not want the tenders on the new plan, but those that were received on Mr. Chappell's plan. He wanted to know if the Commissioner refused to bring down these tenders.

Hon. Mr. McLean—I have already answered the hon. members question.

Hon. Mr. Gordon pointed out that there was a good deal of feeling throughout the country regarding the matter, and the people wanted the fullest information. But the Commissioner does not seem willing to give the information asked for.

On motion of Mr. Sinclair the House went into committee on the bill incorporating the trustees of the north Presbyterian church, Mr. C. A. McKinnon in the chair. Reported agreed to and set down for third reading tomorrow.

Mr. Farquharson moved the House into committee on the bill amending the act incorporating the Y. M. C. A. with Mr. D. A. McKinnon in the chair. Reported agreed to and set down for third reading tomorrow.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the Gas Company's bill was further amended in committee and set down for third reading tomorrow.

House adjourned until 10 a. m. on Friday.

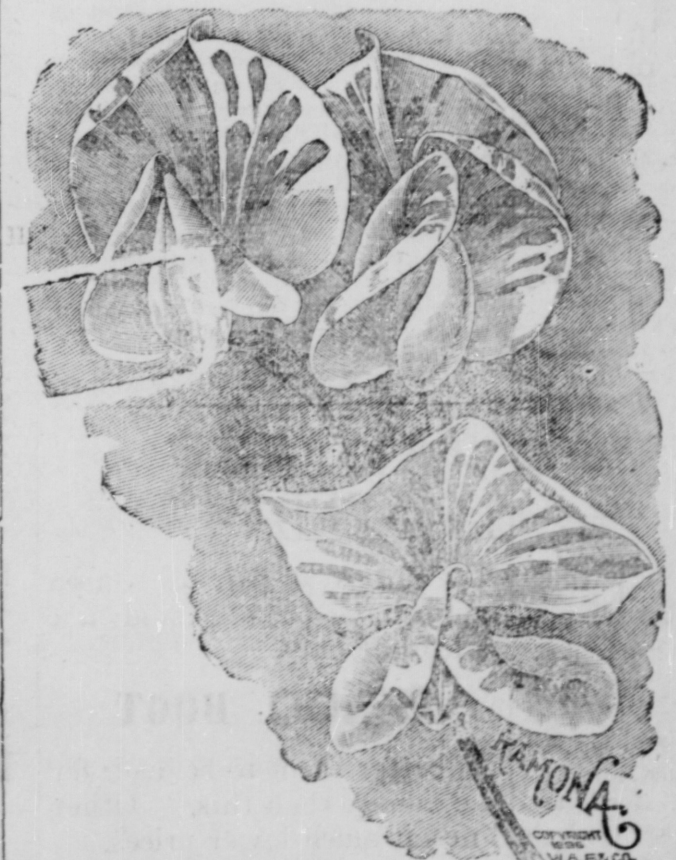
