

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

FUR GOODS A SPECIALTY.—Beer Bros

Cargo of Coal.—The steamer Albert arrived this forenoon with a cargo of coal for Captain McMillan and C. Lyons & Co.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Miramichi arrived from Montreal last evening about ten o'clock, and left again about two this morning.

INSPECTED.—The hull and machinery of the steamship Florida were inspected yesterday by Messrs. Olive and Waring, Dominion inspectors.

THE GLENARE.—The surveying steamer Glenare will leave here on Monday for Pictou to go on the ship, preparatory to going into winter quarters.

WILL BE A GREAT RACE.—This is the day of the match race between Alix, 203, and Drectum, 205. The race takes place on Mystic Park, Boston.

AT ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL.—The Rev. James Simpson will, tomorrow evening, preach the fourth of his course of sermons on Christianity and Agnosticism.

A HEAVY LOSS.—It is reported that Charles McDonald, the keeper of the light-house at St. Andrew's Point, lost \$125 in the fire at that place yesterday.

SCOTT ACT SUMMONS.—A summons for violating the Canada Temperance Act was yesterday served on Mrs. Eliza Mallot Queen Street. It is returnable on Wednesday.

FROM HALIFAX.—The Farnet was detained at Cape George by the storm, and did not arrive here till about one o'clock this morning. She will leave for Halifax, via Summerside and Port Hawkesbury, this afternoon at four o'clock.

EGGS AND POULTRY.—There has been a great demand for the bulletin on eggs and poultry, issued by the Department of Agriculture. Both Messrs. Johnson and Gilbert have a stock yet on hand, and will gladly furnish them to farmers and those interested.

SOCIAL.—The social in the basement of Zion Church last evening was a decided success in every respect. The attendance was large, and all enjoyed themselves. Rev. Mr. Sutherland presided, and a programme consisting of choruses, duets, solos and recitations was capitally carried out.

DISASTROUS FIRE.—The barn of Robert Davidson, at Arleyford, N. S., was destroyed by fire on Thursday last, together with its contents, consisting of five milk cows and one bull, and a quantity of hay, farm implements, etc. The loss is estimated at \$3,000. There is no insurance.

HOME AGAIN.—Samuel Anderson and Lemuel and Harry Winchester returned to the city last evening from Campbell's Point, where they had been camping since Wednesday. They started for home on Wednesday morning, but had to put into Campbell's Point for protection from the small.

NEW DIET FOR COWS.—A few days ago Joseph Robinson of Mountain township, near Kingston, Ont., sold oats in Winchester, and after going home went to the stable to feed his cows. A roll of bills containing \$80 fell out of his pocket and one of the cows swallowed \$40 before he discovered his loss.

THE ELFIN.—Today the ferry steamer Elfin is being hauled up on floats to a position on the breakwater between Poole's and Peake's wharves, preparatory to making a thorough examination with a view to repairing the damage she sustained some time ago. The moving is being done by Midland Egan, under the direction of Kimble Coffin.

A FREE MAN.—Mr. John F. Powers, of Boston, who has been a prisoner in Queen's County Jail for the last six months, late last night completed arrangements with such of his creditors as had process of law against him, and was discharged from jail. He immediately went aboard the Florida, which intended to sail at midnight, and left in that steamer for Boston this morning.

A HORRIBLE DEATH.—A farmer named George Braithwaite, of the sixth concession of Markham, Ont., met with a horrible death last Tuesday afternoon. He was leading home a cow bought at a sale, when the cow ran away, and the rope being around his body, he was dragged some distance, his head striking a stone, broke his skull and killed him. He leaves a widow and family.

SUSPENDED PAYMENT.—W. S. Logie, a general store dealer at Chatham, N. B., has suspended payment. The Halifax Herald says it is understood that the creditors have agreed to accept 40 cents on the dollar, to be guaranteed by the bank of Montreal. The firm claim that there is a nominal surplus of about \$150,000 over the liabilities. The largest claim of any house in Charlottetown is that of Carvell Best, for \$546.

BEAUTIFUL LITANY DESK.—The Canadian Churchman reports: An extremely beautiful litany desk has been recently presented to this parish by Miss S. A. Shaw, in memory of her mother. The desk was made in Jerusalem, from a design by Mr. W. C. Harris, architect, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., specially sent out for the purpose, under the supervision of the Rev. T. E. Dowling, chaplain to the Anglican Bishop in Jerusalem. The material is olive wood from the Mount of Olives, and the whole is magnificently polished. Nothing could exceed the beauty of this exquisitely grained wood when displayed in the expansive top and side of the fast-stool. The desk was dedicated by a most impressive service, closing with the litany and the singing of a litany hymn from H. A. and M. The rector delivered an appropriate address upon the two points of the value of true sentiment, and memorials in the House of God.
