BY HIS EXCELLENCY

GEORGE DUNDAS, ESQUIRE,

Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral and Ordinary of the same, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Island stands prorogued until Thursday, the Fifth day of September instant: I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued until THURSDAY, the Tenth day of OCTOBER next, of which all persons concerned are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of this Island, at Charlottetown, in the said Island, this Fourth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, and in the Thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign.

FIXED LIGHT IN GASPE BAY.

THE Trinity House at Quebec has given Notice that during the season the navigation is open, a Light will be exhibited on the Peninsula in Gaspé Bay, 12 miles N. W. by N. from Cape Gaspé.

The light is a *fixed* white light, elevated 40 feet above the level of the sea, with the following bearings from it:—

Cape Haldimand, South.
Gaspé Basin, W. ½ S.

The light is intended to serve as a guide to vessels passing between Sandy Beach and the main land opposite.

[All Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 26° 20' Westerly in 1867.]
