### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

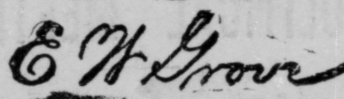

The Boer Attack Was Not Successful.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—It appears that Jacobsdal was not captured by the Boers. Two hundred Boers unsuccessfully attacked the garrison. The Highlanders had fourteen killed and twenty wounded.

### A GRAND MEETING.

Afton Hall Over Crowded—Good Speeches Attentively Heard.

AFTON HALL was over-crowded last evening. The great and increasing interest of the people in the political contest that is now going on, as well as the ability of the speakers, was evidenced by the fact that many in the audience stood throughout the four long hours during which the meeting lasted, and that the utmost attention was paid to the arguments presented. Sir Louis Davies was disturbed for a few minutes by a few questions about bind raine and kerseene oil; but Mr. Stewart's eloquent and convincing reply to his opponent's declarations commanded attention from beginning to end.

John McMillan, Esquire, occupied the chair. Sir Louis Davies was the first speaker. He labored hard to convince the electors that the Tarte-Laurier Administration is good and pure, full of ability, and above all careful to fulfill every promise. But the farmers who are compelled to pay increased prices for all that they have to buy, while they obtain no more, if as much, for what they have to sell, and who see public expenditures constantly increasing without much if any improvement in public works, and extravagance all around, listened with some incredulity.

Mr Stewart commanded attention from the beginning to the end. His speech was exceedingly well delivered, contrasting most favorably with that of Sir Louis, and there was nothing in it which conflicted with the facts known to our farmers. A senip was created when Mr. Stewart brought forth the blue books to prove beyond the peradventure of doubt, that Sir Louis was wrong and he was right regarding superannuation; and he placed Sir Louis in an unenviable position when he pointed out that the knight has failed to apologize like a gentleman for the aspersion cast upon his character. Worse than that he carried the war into Africa when he produced the Auditor-General's report to prove the contrary to the assertion made at New Haven, Sir Louis was personally charged in the public accounts with \$2630.91 received by him in addition to his salary on account of the International Commission. Sir Louis Davies stated that this money was for his hotel and other expenses and that he had not received one dollar of it. Mr. Stewart thereupon pointed out that, in addition, \$1814.02 had been paid for office and hotel rents, and upwards of \$400 for "tips" to servants, together with many other incidental expenses,—the whole amounting to the enormous sum of \$34,000 of the people's money,—for which nothing whatever was obtained.

Mr. Stewart was followed by Premier Farquharson, Dr. McNeill, Dr. Douglass, Mr. Neil Currie, Mr. James McLean, Mr. Dougald Currie and Mr. Neil S. McKenzie. Dr. McNeill's address was a capital one—and altogether the Opposition speakers acquitted themselves so well and so satisfactorily that they were heartily cheered.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the chairman, who replied in suitable terms, and the meeting adjourned with cheers for both candidates.
