

# Saints Triumph Roy Pots Four;

Maurice Roy wove a spell of fascination over the SDU rink last evening as he exploded for three goals in a minute and 55 seconds and then another seven minutes later as he established an MIEL scoring mark and led the SDU club to a 4-1 triumph over the St. Thomas Tommies. 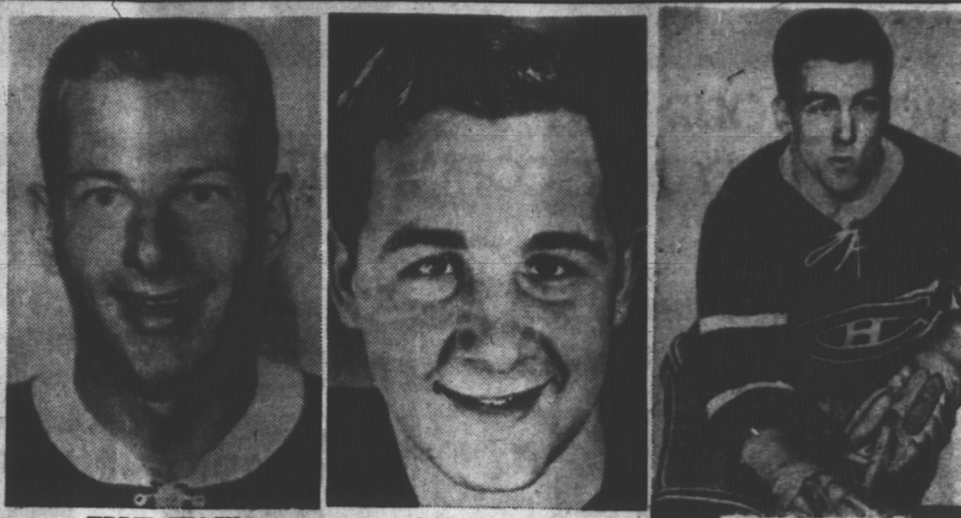

## Rookie Goalie Nips Hawks Habs Win, Wings Lose

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Al Smith, 19-year-old junior netminder playing his first full National Hockey League game, turned back 30 shots Wednesday night to pace Toronto Maple Leafs to a 2-2 victory over Chicago Black Hawks.

Smith was hurried into service at 2:15 of the initial period when starting netminder Gary Smith—no relation—suffered a leg injury.

Both Smiths were with the Leafs because of injuries to regulars Johnny Bower and Terry Sawchuk. Gary Smith is a mem-

ber of Rochester Americans of the American League, while Al plays for Toronto Marlboros of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A Series.

**TIED WITH MONTREAL**  
The defeat cost Chicago sole possession of top spot in the NHL. The Hawks now are tied with Montreal, 3-2 winners Wednesday over Boston.

Orlando Kurtenbach, Tim Horton and Eddie Shack scored for Toronto while Stan Mikita and Phil Esposito countered for Chicago.

Bobby Hull, seeking to break the league record of 50 goals in a single season, did not score a goal but assisted on Esposito's last-period tally.

Hull has 47 goals in 49 games. He has 16 games remaining in which to score four goals to break record he shares with retired Montreal greats, Maurice Richard and Bernie Geoffrion.

**TOOK EARLY LEAD**  
Boston led 2-1 at the end of one period, and the teams battled through a scoreless middle period.

Canadiens missed innumerable scoring opportunities, as the puck took weird hops and bounced and rolled past the net on many occasions.

**NEW YORK 5 DETROIT 0**  
NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Nevin fired two goals and goalie Cesare Maniago turned in New York's first shutout of the season as the Rangers blanked Detroit Red Wings 5-0 in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

Nevin's 25th and 26th goals of the season midway through the second period shook the Rangers loose and Maniago carried them the rest of the way.

The 27-year-old goalie, playing his 12th game for New York, was flawless on 23 Detroit shots as the Red Wings suffered their first shutout of the season.

He handled breakaways by Alex Delvecchio, Floyd Smith and Leo Boivin and on several occasions dived face first on the ice to cover loose pucks.

It was New York's first shutout since Dec. 25, 1964, when the now-retired Jacques Plante blanked Boston Bruins.
