IS CANDIDATE In Ottawa she meets Rex Hammerstein, a reporter for "True Canadian Romances" magazine, who is looking for a story. The idea of taking an immigrant Princess on a tour of Canada appeals to him — until his Editor requires a matrimonial angle in the story with Rex himself as the most available candidate. By this time the Princess has agreed to go along on the tour as it will provide her with the best opportunity of finding the necessary husband.

The tour of Canada begins with a visit to His Excellency the Governor General. In the Governor General's office Rex finds his old flame Clarissa Renfrew, now an officer of the Mounted Police. OTTAWA (CP) — A Supreme Court of Canada Justice Monday reserved decision on an application by the railways for permission to appeal to the court against the latest freight rate ruling of the board of transport commissioners. Mr. Justice C. H. Locke told counsel for the railways and for the provinces — all except Ontario and Quebec — that he expects to deal with the case next week. Charge P.C.'s With Startling Anti-American Propaganda

STEINBACH, Man. (CP) — Social Credit Leader Solon Low Monday night accused the Conservative party of starting anti-American propaganda "which has created a bad climate of relationship between our two countries." He spoke at a nomination meeting in the southeastern Manitoba riding of Provencher which borders the United States. Mr. Low said the Conservatives had done this although in 1945 they supported Canada's entry into the Bretton Woods Agreement which required payment for Canadian exports in gold or American dollars. He said that at the prime minister's conference in London last summer, Prime Minister Diefenbaker "in a clumsy way tried to undo some of the damage he and his party had helped the Liberals do" in supporting the Bretton Woods Agreement. Mr. Diefenbaker had announced a plan to transfer 15 per cent of Canadian purchases from the U.S. to the U.K. and the Commonwealth. CLIMATE OF REPRISAL Mr. Low said this created a "climate of reprisal" and the Americans called for a 15-per cent cut on oil imports. He urged acceptance of sterling for Canada's agricultural exports and a two-price system for disposal of farm products. The Social Credit party had proposed "that where nations wanting Canadian goods were not able to get them through normal trade channels, we accept

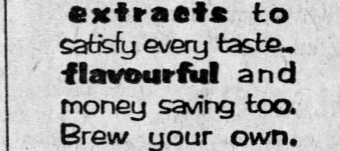
