MILITARY CAMP.

Camp Brighton Opens Tomorrow, and Will Last Twelve Days.

The military camp at Brighton will open tomorrow morning and will continue for twelve days. The artillery will camp at Victoria Park and the infantry on the barrack ground across the road. Lieut. Col. Moore will be commandant of the camp.
