LORD STANLEY'S MOVEMENTS.—His Excellency the Governor General spent Monday in Furo, and afterwards went to Acadia Mines. At both places he was enthusiastically received. He and his party passed through Miramichi on Tuesday evening on their way to Ottawa, having spent the entire month in the province.

SHIPMENT OF LIVE GESE.—A cat containing 1,465 live geese passed through Moncton Monday night en route to the United States. Mr. A. W. Burt purchased the birds in Prince Edward Island. They were brought over in crates to Point du Chene, loaded in car No. 3,030, the car having six floors; each floor has two pairs containing water. He will take them to Mansfield, Mass., and expects to get there on Thursday evening, 30th. As far as could be seen they were in good order. Mr. Burt will go with them to look after the feeding and water. He reports that in his shipment of geese on the 2nd October he lost thirty-six. On the arrival of the train at Portland, Me. they failed to connect, and had to remain over forty-eight hours for the next train. By this delay the geese must have been confined in the car fully 116 hours.—Times.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Ottawa News. OTTAWA, Oct. 29. The first snow of the season fell here to-day.

The Iron and Steel Institute, numbering 125 members, will be entertained here on Friday.

Thomas Edison, the great inventor, has bonded thirty thousand acres of nickel property in Sudbury district. His expert here says it is the richest mining region in the world. Edison claims the new process he discovered will greatly cheapen the production of nickel.

Mr. Hewitt, agent of the Kidderminster Manufacturing Co., of England, had an interview with the Minister of Finance yesterday in reference to a proposal to start a branch manufactory in Canada. It is proposed to begin with the manufacture of Brussels carpets only, and to employ about 400 hands. The company has a capital of \$350,000 sterling, and has in England 15,000 employees.

Failure in the Lobster Trade. HALIFAX, Oct. 29. John P. Chetwynd, of this city, who has been conducting business as a lobster packer and fish merchant on the Newfoundland coast, has assigned to William Roche, M. P. P. His liabilities are heavy.

Albert Gayton, M. P. P., has resigned his seat in the Legislature to accept the Registry of Deeds for Yarmouth Co.

Mrs. James Allen took a fit at 7 o'clock this morning and fell into an open grate in her house. Her clothing caught fire, and in a moment was in a mass of flames. A neighbor, hearing the alarm her children made, rushed in, and, stripping off his coat, extinguished her blazing clothes. The woman was terribly burned, and after great suffering, died in the afternoon.

The Birchall Case. LONDON, Oct. 30. The books at Morley's hotel show that Reginald Birchall, Mrs. Birchall and Col. Lewis—the latter supposed to be the Colonel who is the alleged author of the letter received by Birchall, in which the writer acknowledges he shot and killed Benwell—were at the hotel last January. Birchall and Col. Lewis seemed on intimate terms. A number of waiters at the hotel stated this afternoon that they remember Col. Lewis, and that he was there when the murder was committed. They remember distinctly that the manager of the hotel and the Colonel discussed the murder.

Shipping Disaster. FREEPORT, La., Oct. 29. The brig Eugenie, owned and commanded by Capt. Daniel Munroe, of Halifax, N. S., 57 days out from Brazil, went ashore on the bar at Jones' Inlet last night and has gone to pieces. The Captain and crew of six men were rescued by the crew of the Short Beach Life Saving Station. The Eugenie was insured for \$4,000.

For the Seal Fishery. NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 29. The schooner Unibnams, owned by J. W. Peppert and Thomas Voght, of this town, and bound for British Columbia, intended for the seal fishery, left this afternoon at 3 o'clock under most favorable circumstances.

Recalcitrant Priests. CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 29. The Greek patriarchs have refused to take any notice of the commissioners appointed to effect an understanding between the Porte and the Greek synod, or to abide by its decisions.

An Incapable King. THE HAGUE, Oct. 29. By a vote of 109 to 5, the Dutch Parliament to-day declared the King incapable of governing.

The African Explorer. LONDON, Oct. 29. Mr. and Mrs. Henry M. Stanley sailed on the Teutonic from Liverpool for New York to-day.

Western Notes. R. C. McLeod shipped another lot of live geese—1500 this time—for the United States on Monday morning. Mr. McLeod is under contract to forward a certain number.

Monday afternoon the fine weather of the past few days gave way to cloudy skies, and in the evening rain began falling, which late in the night came down heavily. By Tuesday morning the wind, which was blowing from a southwesterly direction, had increased to a gale. The tide was high at about eleven o'clock, and with the wind in the direction it was, the water reached a higher mark than it has for many years past. This, together with the force of the waves, did considerable damage to the wharves in the harbor. The shipping escaped with scarcely any harm, although some schooners at anchor dragged some-what. The house at the west side of Queen's wharf, used by Mr. Albert Gaudet as a lobster factory, was washed away and scattered along the breastwork. At the west end of the town a barn was washed down, and the family had to move out. Holman's wharf was damaged somewhat, and Muirhead's wharf was also considerably injured as well. The causeway at the north end of Wilnot bridge, up the river, sustained considerable damage in the storm, and we learn that a breastwork Mr. Alex. Laird had built to prevent his land from washing away, went adrift and landed on top of the road at the north end of the bridge.
