SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. LATE IRISH NEWS

O'Brien Denies the Charge of the Parnellites

That He and Dillon Hounded Parnell to Death.

Mr. Parnell's Alleged Successor a Mere Figurehead.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

William O'Brien, in the course of a statement, denounces the charges made by the Parnellites that Dillon and he hounded Parnell to death. He gives the details of the Boulogne conference, stating that the unalterable basis of all communications with Mr. Parnell at Boulogne was, first and last, his retirement from the leadership. We kept three objects always in view. First, it was impossible that Mr. Parnell could continue as chairman of the parliamentary committee; secondly, to soften the memory of Parnell's fault by every possible palliative and evidence of good will which his friends could suggest; thirdly, to avert the calamities we keenly felt were irreparable from any disruption of the forces. Had the terms we suggested been loyally accepted, the party would have been re-united under the leadership of Mr. McCarthy, leaving Mr. Parnell an honorable place in Irish public life.

Pierce Mahoney, M. P., for North Meath, speaking at Dublin yesterday, was greeted as the leader of the Parnellites. He saluted at Dillon and O'Brien. Mahoney is a mere figurehead. He is a poor speaker, and has no gifts as a tactician. Redmond is the actual leader. The exasperation of the factions increases daily.

LATEST FROM OTTAWA

New Fisheries Regulations.

Inland Revenue Returns

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.

The steamer Acadia has been ordered to visit the Bay of Fundy coast before going into her winter quarters.

Fishing regulations issued permit for the present season fishing for salmon and trout until the end of the present month. Previous regulations required that the close season commence on Oct. 15th. After this season the close season for trout and white fish will be from Oct. 15th until Nov. 3.

The inland revenue returns for September amount to \$851,000.

THE GREAT GALE.

COLLISION AT SEA.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

Telegrams from Portland say a Dutch man-of-war has been in collision off Portland Bill with the British barque Mysterious Star. Both vessels were greatly damaged.
