JURIST PEEP DIES
LONDON (Reuters) - Lord Schuster, 86, an eminent legal authority, died Thursday night. He was clerk to the crown and permanent secretary to the lord chancellor from 1915 to 1944. Lord Schuster was the last man officially to read out the titles of King Edward VIII (later the Duke of Windsor) when Parliament accepted the king's declaration of abdication bill in December, 1936.

3 In Hospital After Collision

A car-truck collision at New Perth about 11 p.m. Saturday night sent three men to the Montague Memorial Hospital.

A late model Chevrolet car driven by Errol MacNeill of Charlottetown while en route to Georgetown collided with a ton truck loaded with eggs believed owned by the Co-op. Mr. MacNeill was accompanied by Mr. Preston and Charlen Henry, also of Charlottetown.

All three were rushed to the King's County Memorial Hospital where it was discovered that Mr. MacNeill suffered severe lacerations of the forearm and face.

Preston and Charlen Henry also suffered facial and scalp lacerations. They will be in hospital for several days. The car was completely demolished.

The truck driver was unhurt as far as can be ascertained.

The truck was not seriously damaged. The road was completely blocked by eggs and crates for a short time.

Death Sunday Of Mr. Aubrey Shaw

The death occurred in Charlottetown on July 1 of Aubrey Shaw, in his 67th year, after a lengthy illness.

The deceased was born in Brudenell, P.E.I., where he attended school and spent the most of his adult life farming in that district, where he was a valued member of the community. He moved to Montague with his family several years ago.

Besides his widow, the former Elva Keith, Montague, he leaves to mourn three daughters; Inez (Mrs. Wallace MacKenna), Red Deer, Alberta; Olive (Mrs. James Webb), Halifax, N.S.; and Eleanor, at home. Also three brothers, Cyril and Herman, at Brudenell, and Wendall, Chicago, Illinois. A brother Earl and a sister, Florence, predeceased him.

The funeral will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m., from Trinity United Church, Montague. Interment will be in the community cemetery.
