### PERMANENT DISORDER

"It may mean that the alcoholic has developed a permanent disorder that cannot be cured by present-day knowledge," he said. An example given was only one disease known by medical men as "Korsokov's psychosis"... a permanent injury to the brain structure.

Those who usually contact this disease become permanent patients of mental institutions. "Society should work out a prevention in order to be consistent with modern medical procedures," Mr. Linton said.
